

PREFACE

Establishment- KVA DAV College for Women, Karnal is a premier institution of Haryana with the distinction of being the first women college of the state. Inspired by Swami Dayanand Saraswati's vision of the potential in women and the need to educate and empower them, this college was established in 1958, by a group of Arya Samajis led by Lala Makhan Lal Ji, Dr. Ganesh Das Ji and Principal Mela Ram Ji Barq with only hundred students, 4 lecturers and 4 members of non-teaching staff. After 28 years of its inception, the management of the college was handed over to DAV College Managing Committee, New Delhi which is the largest, non-governmental educational society in India running about 800 institutes across India and abroad. The name of 'Kumari Vidyawati Anand' was prefixed in 1997 to this institute in honour of her selfless and magnanimous service and donation of her lifetime earnings to the cause of education for women.

DAV MOVEMENT <u>http://www.davcmc.net.in/dav_move_background.html-</u> The Indian society was at its cultural, social and political nadir when Maharishi Dayanand Saraswati was born in 1824. He grew up in an environment of political subjugation, where he witnessed extreme casteism, superstition, religious dogma and **social oppression of women** and marginalized sections of society. He openly stood up against all the social evils such as discrimination on grounds of caste, creed, sex, economic status and social bigotry, male chauvinism and religious dominance of higher castes over the backward castes and classes. He fought for the rights of women and opened "Kanya Vidyalayas" to empower and enlighten them. Unfortunately, the task of social resurgence was too vast to be completed during his lifetime and when Maharishi attained Samadhi in 1883, the Indian society was only partially reformed, with the onus of completing this unfinished task falling on his followers.

Taking a stock of the ground realities of Indian society and the nature of the task undertaken by Maharishi, his followers decided to commemorate his life and works by opening temples of learning - schools and colleges where all the values advocated by Maharishi would be inculcated in the children so that they could carry forward his message and work ceaselessly throughout their life to carry out the reforms suggested by him. In **1885**, the **first DAV School** was established at **Lahore** which was subsequently **upgraded** to become the **first DAV College**. In 1886, the DAV College Trust and Management Society was established and registered. The DAV Society visualized that the DAV Schools and colleges shall produce men and women of sterling national character and social commitment. The commendable objectives of the DAV attracted several committed individuals and groups to serve the society by

striving to collect petty donations to set up DAV Schools and colleges to spread Maharishi's message for enlightening all the Indians. Thus the crusade against ignorance, illiteracy, injustice and inequality was revived and it gained further momentum with the opening of each DAV School. Thus started the movement led by missionaries, visionaries, nationalistic and other like-minded people. The DAV institutions soon gained respect and reputation in the society and began to be recognized for their high academic standards and value-based education. The faculty comprised of towering personalities such as Mahatma Hansraj, Principal Gyan Chand, Lala Sain Das and Pandit Meher Chand, who selflessly dedicated their lives to the re-engineering of the Indian society through modern education and Vedic values. A glorious DAV alumni is a testimony to these facts.

As his most important legacy, **Mahatma Hans Raj** left behind a pragmatic and enlightened approach to education. One aspect of his approach was his choice of **English- oriented Science-based education** with a blend of **Vedic values**, thus the name 'Dayanand Anglo Vedic', and another, was the great emphasis he laid on women education. Lastly, true to the egalitarian basis of Arya Samaj philosophy, he believed in **equality for all students irrespective of their caste, colour or creed**. KVA DAV College for Women, bearing the torch of values, as propagated by our founders, is marching ahead at a fast pace. Over the years, the college has grown into a renowned and acknowledged institute of the State, serving the cause of value based higher education for women. It had been declared a "Model College" and "Pace Setting Women's College" by National Institute of Education, Planning and Administration in 1992.

The college is located in the heart of Karnal city, catering to the needs of students from the urban and the adjoining rural areas. Since then this institution has carried on the baton of this mission with staunch commitment and devotion. The cream of students from Karnal distt, U.P., Delhi, Bengal, Rajasthan and Punjab vie for admission to this old institute of high reputation and eminence in the region. This year 2654 students have taken admission. There are 101 lecturers and 60 members of non-teaching staff on our rolls. Students are pursuing 16 UG and 7 PG courses along with Add-on-Courses, Community College. The campus spreads over an area of 3.5 acres. It has enviable infrastructure. There are 2 new buildings, 5 stories each with lift facility. All have spacious classrooms, well equipped labs, toilet facility and water coolers on each floor. A spacious library, reading room UGC Resource Centre, conference and seminar rooms, a multipurpose Auditorium, Botanical Garden, a 3 acre sports ground away from the city, cafeteria, bank, book shop, healthcare centre, medical room and gym, sprawling lawn, common room, and a cheerful Hostel are some of the facilities provided. Regular Yagnas are performed by the faculty and students almost weekly.

Value based morals imbibed with discipline is the USP of this institution, we build leaders here. **Astronaut Kalpana Chawla** and many of our Alumnae who started their higher education in this institution have moved on to become leaders of motivation, often thinking outside the realm of common thought to come up with new ideologies that generate growth and development in the human race.

We are ranked as the best College of the region in Science and Commerce streams. We have a cut- off of 90% and above in both these streams. We have been **acknowledged by the Dept. of Biotechnology, Govt. of India,** under its **'Star College Scheme'** as recipient of grants of 66 lakhs, focussed on additional skill development amongst undergraduate students. The curriculum growth of UG and PG courses indicates a continuous journey beyond the threshold of mediocrity to soar into an ever continuing explorative experience in quality education. Our **logo** reverberates from a shloka **'Vidya Dadati Vinayam'**, excerpted it says that knowledge brings humility from which accrues capability and capability gives earning power, wealth and dharma.

The college has witnessed many changes during the last five years. All the programmes are directed towards realization of our Mission and achieving our objectives, in keeping with the values of DAV College Managing Committee, New Delhi which directly manages this college, as propounded by its founders. We at KVA DAV College for Women, resound with the credo that education must enable a woman to become more efficient, to achieve with increasing facility the legitimate goals of her life and must also train one for quick, resolute and effective thinking. We have aimed at propagating ethical qualities to be imbibed by our young ladies. We believe that the purpose of education is to enable individuals to reach their full potential as human beings, not only individually but also as members of a society. Therefore other than efficient classroom teaching of elected subjects in an interactive and research based methodology, we encourage the students and train them to think intensively and critically, because we consider that education must enable the students to examine facts, to discern the truth from the sham, and be able to sift reality from fantasy. Our goal towards this effort is a hope perhaps that this Pedagogy will help us to prepare the citizens of tomorrow for the predictable changes; they must meet in their lives. Our quintessence is in Fostering Integrity, Acquiring Competencies, Striving for Excellence and serving the Society and the entire gamut of actions in this institution are woven with these values.

During the past five years, stringent quality assessments were attended by the IQAC and the college has made tireless efforts to comply with those recommendations and in addition, more efforts have been taken in that regard. The IQAC allowed the college to introspect and improve on quality parameters. A more functional IQAC with defined roles and responsibilities was a major initiative taken by the college. Most of the teachers were involved in preparing the SSR along with the IQAC. Introspections and discussions amongst teachers have helped in preparing a precise Self Study Report (SSR).

The college has witnessed many changes during the last five years. Some experienced teachers retired and the next generation of teachers have taken over the responsibility of carrying forward the tradition and legacy of the college. Some new academic programmes like M.Sc. Computer Science, M.Sc. Geography, PGDCA, BCA, B.Com (Voc.), B.Voc., Community College, etc. were initiated and are being conducted successfully. This has also given an opportunity to invite and interact with experts from various fields who shared their knowledge and helped in expanding our academic horizons and enhancing the overall quality of teaching-learning. Resource mobilization from various funding agencies was taken up as a major strategy to improve the infrastructure, augment teaching-learning facilities and allocate



projects to students to make learning more 'student centric'. The college has the potential for excellence. We have a bunch of motivated teachers who regularly pursue their efforts towards excellence by redefining the teachinglearning process. The college was also awarded Programmes like DBT (Department of Biotechnology, Ministry of Science and Technology)-STAR COLLEGE SCHEME which have focused on additional skill development amongst undergraduate students and enhanced the infrastructure for research. Research endeavours have been geared up in the last five years with increased participation of students and teachers in research. The Red Cross, Eco- Club, WDC, NSS, etc. are working in collaboration with NGOs and other (Civil Society Organizations) for more effective and meaningful community service. These programmes have sensitized students and provided opportunities for experiential learning.

On the administrative front, a separate account and staff for self-financing programmes was established to cater to all the administrative needs of self-financing programmes. Language Laboratory has been set up for enhancing communication skills. IT infras7tructure has been continually improved, with wi-fl connectivity available all around the campus. All the departments are connected with internet through a lease line of 2 Mbps. A new ERP system has been implemented for streamlining administrative and admission procedures in the general office.

The preparation of SSR involved continuous efforts by the IQAC which checked its authencity at every step. The SSR is divided into two volumes. The first volume includes the Preface, Executive Summary and SWOC of the institution, Profile of the college, Criterion wise inputs, and Evaluative Reports of the Departments. The second volume provides the Annexures supporting the data provided in the first volume. The SSR has been shared with teachers, students and the Management at every stage of its preparation and finalization. I take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks to each and every individual colleague for their valuable contribution in preparing the SSR. I express my deep sense of gratitude to the President of DAV College Managing Committee, New Delhi and Chairman of the Governing Body Dr. Punam Suri, General Secretary Shri R.S. Sharma, all Vice-Presidents, Secretaries, treasurers and all the members of the Managing Committee and Governing Body for their undaunted support in all the endeavors of the college. I would also like to acknowledge the tireless efforts of the IOAC, Members of the Steering Committee, all seven Criteria In-charges, Head of Departments, all teachers, Alumni and dear students for their support in our journey towards excellence. I am extremely happy that the entire work of preparation of SSR has helped in defining policies, strategies, systems and procedures in a better way to serve as a blueprint for further growth and development of the college.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY AND SWOC ANALYSIS


Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

Kumari Vidyavati Anand DAV College for Women sticks to its Motto 'WE' of Women Empowerment' and provides the environment which exudes the spirit 'FOR THE WOMEN, OF THE WOMEN AND BY THE WOMEN'. In the realization of its vision of emancipation and empowerment of women through value based holistic higher education, the college offers a plethora of Courses.

- 16 UG and 7 PG programmes are offered by the college, affiliated to Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra of which 13 UG and 7 PG programmes are self-financed.
- The curriculum is further strengthened by **career-oriented add on courses** (Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma) to enhance their employability and competitive abilities (Functional English, Beauty Culture & Cosmetology, Fashion Designing, Food Processing and preservation, GIS and Remote Sensing) have been introduced. The college is offering **job-oriented courses** like B. Voc. (FSQC), B. Voc. (FT) under the scheme of National Skills Qualification Framework (NSQF) and Diploma in Health Care under Community College (UGC).
- To keep pace with the changing global trends and requirements, **professional courses** like BBA, BCA and B.Sc. Fashion Designing were initiated.
- The IQAC monitors and evaluates the quality of its enrichment programmes. The exposure of faculty in recent advances through participation in and organization of National/International Conferences, Seminars, Workshops and Refresher/ Orientation Courses, feedback from students (oral) and academic experts give the right impetus and direction for necessary changes in the curriculum.
- Faculty Development Programmes on **ICT** based teaching-learning provide further scope for dynamism in curriculum designing. Members of Board of Studies nominated by the affiliating university make significant contribution in making the curriculum relevant in the changing global scenario.
- **Remedial Classes** and coaching for **Entry-into-services** were arranged for the students. **Extra classes** are held for meritorious and week students. The provision of internship and training in the final year of UG and PG give exposure to the students and enhance their employability.


Criterion II: Teaching- Learning and Evaluation

The college offers value based education par excellence for the holistic development of young women.


- The college ensures the admission process with wide publicity through college prospectus, website, national newspapers and cable chhanels. It is dealt with total transparency as per University rules.
- The guidelines which are provided by the University for Admission, Curriculum, Examination and Evaluation is followed in totality.
- Students' profiles are assessed by the college to categorize the trends of student's interest. SC/BC and other marginalized student are segregated to provide best opportunities as per government rules.
- Special academic counceling is given to the students at the time of admission as most of the students come from rural areas.
- The teaching and learning is student-centric which nurtures the critical thinking, creativity and scientific tamper among the student to meet the global challenges.
- Advance and slow learners are identified through their academic performances. They are provided with additional time, learning material and assistance from the teachers time to time.
- All the weaker section, differently-abled and reserved categories are given due benefits by the college. Special care is given to differently-abled students by providing the classes at the ground floor or by the lift facility.
- New enriched job-oriented courses have been started to train the students in the emerging areas of study and entrepreneurship to build competencies. Keeping in view the need of the hour computer literacy has been made mandatory for all the students in first semester.
- The college has various committees to deal with the issues of gender sensitization and environment conservation.
- The college continuously monitors the curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities through IQAC. Results are monitored and proper action is taken. Extensive counseling is provided to the students.




- The use of modern teaching aids like OHP, internet enabled computer system are usually employed in classrooms. The teaching is through ICT method for most subjects. Smart boards, e-teaching aids, EDUSAT lab, UGC Resource Center are used to ensure effective teaching.
- The college teacher really acts as true friend, philosopher and guide for the students, carefully monitoring the regularity of attendance, their participation in seminars and other activities. Psycho-social support and guidance is given by Student Council, Women Development Cell and Grievance Redressal Cell.
- The stakeholders of the institution that is student, faculty members and parents are informed about the evaluation process and results.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Kumari Vidyavati Anand DAV College for Women has made a dynamic effort in research, consultancy and outreach programmes. The college has a Research Committee consisting of experienced faculty which accesses the requirements for a particular department and recommends the purchase and procurement of equipments and other research related facilities.

- The college has received **special grant of Rs. 66.00 lakhs under STAR College Scheme, sponsored by DBT** for developing research facilities for basic sciences from the session 2011 to 2014.
- The faculty of the college is encouraged to organize seminars/conferences/ workshops/Extension Lectures. As a result 14 seminars/conferences/ symposium, 62 workshops and 83 extension lectures have been organized to inculcate scientific temper among the staff and students. 88 eminent scholars/academicians/ scientists from reputed institutions have been invited for this purpose.
- Various reputed **institutes visited by our students** to explore various research facilities are NDRI (Karnal), NBAGR (Karnal), CSSRI (Karnal), DWR (Karnal), FRI (Dehradun), Tissue Culture Labs, Cooperative Sugar Mill (Karnal), Nitin Life Sciences (Karnal) and ITI (Karnal). The students also visit various departments and libraries of universities like Punjab University, Chandigarh, Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra, Panjabi University, Patiala, HAU, Hissar, GJU, Hissar and MDU, Rohtak.
- Financial provisions are made available by the college to support projects by students as well. **325 projects** and **39 science working models** have been prepared by students from the session 2010 to 2015.
- 03 faculty of the college have been awarded Ph. D degree, 01 has submitted and 09 faculty are enrolled in reputed universities for pursuing their research. 08 Books, 04 Chapters in Books, 01 Monograph, 53 Research Papers in reputed National/International journals with good impact factor have been published in the last four years. Academic Leave is sanctioned to the teachers to attend National/International seminars/ conferences/ workshops. The college provides TA/DA to the teachers for attending seminars/conferences/workshops who have no funding from UGC or other funding bodies.



- Free access to computers with internet through **Wi-fi** and **INFLIBNET** along with facility of **UGC Resource Centre** is provided to the staff and students.
- **06 Research Awards** and **20 recognitions/honours** have been received by the Principal and faculty from reputed professional bodies and agencies for their outstanding contribution to society.
- The students are socially sensitized and made aware of their responsibilities through community service programmes. The college has **two units of NSS** and **two wings of NCC (Air Wing & Army Wing)** through which it renders social services. The college organizes **Blood Donation Camp** annually and also **programmes on environmental awareness, tree plantation,** etc.
- **Consultancy Service** is also provided by the Principal, Dr. Reeta Sehgal, as she is the Honorary Manager of 07 DAV Aided and Public Schools.
- The **Department of Psychology** strives to ensure the welfare of students by providing them with **emotional and academic assistance**. Consultancy in **Health Care through Health Sector Skill Council, New Delhi** is also provided.
- The **Department of Home Science** provides consultancy by organizing trainings in **dress designing, stitching, cosmetology, embroidery, fabric paintings, and food preservation**.
- The Department of Zoology organizes regular workshops and consultancy on **vermi-compost and fishery** from time to time to promote organic farming.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources


- Our college has state-of-art infrastructure which comprises of **Principal's Office, Administrative Office, Arts Block, Commerce Block, and Science Block** with the elevator facility. A new **Home Science and Commerce Block** including the **facility of lift** is under construction.
- To meet the latest requirements of curriculum, we have a total number of 72 classrooms that are well furnished and some of them are equipped with ICT and related media like smart boards, overhead projectors, projectors, Xerox machines, visualizers, computers, TVs, LCDs audio players, multi-media projectors and 24 hours internet facility in the college campus.
- The college has 24 laboratories, 01 central library, 01 Botanical Garden, 01 beautiful and well-manicured lawn, 01 Museum, 01 Conference Hall, 01 Audio-visual Hall and 01 multi-purpose auditorium SANKALP with 02 Seminar Rooms.
- The college has Makhan Lal Arya Hostel that provides a homely stay to our students. The hostel has a total number of 99 rooms along with a hygienic mess, dining hall, reception room-cum-office, recreational room, indoor and outdoor sports, and computer facility with access to internet.
- The college has facilities for **indoor and outdoor sports** like Basket Ball, Badminton, Table Tennis, Fencing etc. For the physical fitness, the college has a **well-equipped Gymnasium** with magnetic bike, treadmill, two single station unit and various other devices.



- The college has a **Health Care Centre** with the facility of a visiting wellqualified doctor (part-time) to provide medical aid to the students. First-Aid kits are also available in the college and hostel to meet any contingency.
- To provide safe drinking water, water purifiers and ROs have been installed on each floor of the college building and hostel building.
- Our college has a well-organized, well-stocked and **automated Library** with a seating capacity of 150 readers. Besides the regular features such as photostat, printing, scanning and **OPAC**, our library offers access to e-resources through **INFLIBNET** (**n-list**) program under UGC-**INFONET**. Orientation Programmes, Books Exhibition and sale of old recreational magazines are some of the other significant features of the Library.
- For round the clock security, **CCTV cameras** have been installed at the entrance of both the college and hostel. In addition to this, there is also a **guardroom** room for security purposes.

Criterion V: Student Support & Progression

This criterion includes two main parts: Student Support and Student Progression

1. Student Support: This part includes all the support facilities available to the students from the institution and assistance from government and other national agencies. The support facilities from the institution include the publication of Prospectus (including Academic Calendar), College Magazine 'Echoes', Newsletter 'Sankalp'. It also includes the financial assistance to the students in the form of scholarships and freeships to needy, SC/BC, Economically weaker, fatherless and sports students. The



other support facilities includes skill development programs, **support for slow learners**, counseling services, **career guidance and placements**, redressing of students grievances, special dietary supplements and uniforms to sports students, welfare schemes like Book Bank facility, electricity back up, internet facility, value education etc.

2. Student Progression: It tracks the student progression to higher level of education and towards employment. It mentions the number of students who have cleared various competitive exams, who have got placement, number of students getting prizes in various sports activities and positions in co-curricular, extracurricular and cultural activities.


IQAC plays an important role in bridging the gap between syllabus provided by the University and effective curriculum delivery in the institution; the initiatives taken up are as follows:

Career information Seminars by experts drawn from various domains form another source by which we inform and enlighten our students on various opportunities open to them.


- * **Community Orientation**: NSS, NCC, Red Ribbon Club takes care of the community services and evokes social consciousness among students.
- The college has two units of NSS working for the community. The NSS Unit of the college engages the students in community development activities which motivate them to take up the cause of Social Service.
- The NSS volunteers regularly visits surrounding areas and villages where people are provided awareness on various social, moral, ethical principles and ways of life. The college has adopted Ambedkar Basti.
- Blood Donation Camps are conducted every year where large number of students and faculty donate blood.
- These clubs sensitize the society and girl-students regarding AIDS, various problems pertaining to society and train them to serve humanity with human touch. For e.g human chain of 2000 students was formed on November 11, 2010 to assert feminine identity. Mrs. Sumita Singh, MLA, Karnal addressed the students. Banners and Posters displaying various social messages were the highlights of the events.

1.3.5. Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

Although there is no formal system of getting feedback on curriculum, the teachers gain student's feedback in the classrooms in the form of interactions, discussions and suggestions. The inputs thus obtained are further used to improvise the overall competency of the students for employability. IQAC analyses the feedback, discusses it with the Principal and convey it to university through members of Board of Studies.

For example:

- 1. Increase in curriculum i.e. Vocational, Professional, P.G., Add-on Course, Hobby courses were introduced.
- 2. Seminar Room and Computer Labs were established.
- 3. Internet facility in Library has been provided.
- 4. Centre Lab facility was provided, new labs established for M. Sc. (Bio Technology).
- 5. EDUSAT, Smart Boards, LCD Projectors have been installed to equip the students with the latest mode of learning.
- 6. Virtual labs have been established to enrich the quality of teaching.
- 7. Some new courses like Office Management and Secretarial Practice; Advertising, Sales Promotion and Sales Management; B.Com Computer Application, BCA, PGDCA, BTM, B.Sc. Fashion Designing, B. Voc (FSQC & FT) and Diploma in Health Care (Community College), GIS and Remote Sensing and Web- Designing; M.Sc. Geography, M.Sc. Biotech, M.Sc. Mathematics and M.Sc. Computer Science, Physical Education as new elective subject, B.Sc. Computer Science, B.Sc. Computer Application have been introduced.



The college has a very clear and transparent way to monitor and evaluate the quality of various enrichment programmes initiated by it. The quality of these programmes is monitored by the IQAC through periodic interaction with faculty and by checking the regularity of student attendance and participation. The assessment is made by analyzing the feedback in the form of interactions, discussions and suggestions. The Principal interacts with faculty from time to time and amends the enrichment programs to meet the desired objectives. The Principal and faculty also analyze the University results and initiate necessary actions. The college makes sure that the programmes offered in the curriculum include contribution to national development, fostering global competencies among students, inculcating a value system among students, promoting the issue of latest technology and quest for excellence.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the university?

Members of the University Board of Studies play a very dynamic role in framing the syllabi of the courses provided by the University for its Affiliating Colleges.

For Add-on course which are introduced by the college itself, the curricula are designed by our own departmental faculty which meets the global needs.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Although there is no formal system of getting feedback on curriculam, the teachers gain student's feedback in the classrooms in the form of interactions, discussions and suggestions. Suggestions for improvements are communicated by the members of the Board of Studies, to the authority of the affiliating University in the meetings. Suggestions are taken over by the university. If the changes are made, that is circulated among all the affiliated colleges. University itself also revises the syllabi pattern from time to time to meet the global needs.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?

While choosing programmes to be introduced, we keep in mind the college's goals and **objectives**, and prioritize those that would do justice to them. Looking at the emerging trends and global wants, the needs of women along with requirements of the nation and the society are the considerations that weigh with us the most when we think of introducing a new course.

Transparency:


Hundred percent transparency is ensured. Admission Committee of the college strictly adheres to the rules and regulations formulated by the government and the University for Affiliated Colleges. The college also follows the guidelines regarding reservations to the backward classes unfailingly and follows the Academic Calendar, provided by the affiliating University, i.e. Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. The college offers undergraduate and postgraduate courses. Date of sale of Application Forms/ Prospectus is notified. Application forms can be bought from office and on the spot enquiries are also attended. Selection of students to the course is based on marks obtained in qualifying exam. The college admits the students solely on the basis of eligibility as per university rules and merit in the qualifying examination for UG and PG courses of Science and Commerce stream. Admission in Arts stream is based on first come and first serve basis along with eligibility.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes. The college forms Admission Committee chaired by the Principal for different streams. Before and after the admissions, students' profile is received to identify the trends on:

- Profiles are assessed by the college to categorize the trends of students' interests towards their best streams chosen.
- Students are given career counseling during admission and shifts are made according to aptitude.
- SC/BC and other marginalized students are segregated to provide best opportunities as per government rules.
- Freeships/scholarships are awarded which are based on the students profile by judging their academic background, economic status and level of disability.

Outcome:-

As a result of this process, in the last five years, the college has observed a rise in the number of students. Seats were increased under SFS via adopting proper channel because the number of aided seats was limited.

Liberal scholarships and concessions from the college funds are provided to the students who apply for it.



Trends Observed:

• Students' enrolment to Arts is declining due to global trend and inclination towards professional courses in Sciences and commerce.

Action Taken:

- Introduction of Add-on-Courses under Dual Degree Programmes specific for Arts students.
- The college has started job-oriented courses which are beneficial for the society. For eg. B. Voc, Diploma in Health Care.
- Extra coaching classes for weak students.
- Faculty is advised to provide encouraging academic and psychological support.
- The college faculty boosts the students to enroll for higher education by providing counseling and financial aid is also given.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college caters to the needs of differently- able students complying with government policies. Reservation is as per University rules and mentioned in the Prospectus. Equal opportunities are given and they are given special care. For such students, the classes are held at the ground flour. Facility of lift is also provided to such students.

The faculty takes the following steps for their holistic development:

- Encouragement
- Physical help
- University approval for help in exam
- Lift facility

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

We admit students of all calibers as per their eligibility. In order to satisfy their queries, the college ensures that the teachers are available to answer their doubts, pertaining to the admissions/Courses etc from various streams. Each teaching faculty spares three days of their summer vacation (after 15th June) for this purpose. Apart from this, personal counseling, Orientation Programme or Career Mela is organized in the beginning of the session.



2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

(Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.)

- Enrolled students of the college are from rural as well as urban areas. The girl-students are mostly from the rural areas which lead to lack of confidence in them as compared to the students living in city. This parity has to be bridged. For this, first of all, counseling at the time of admission is provided so as to get the stream of their choice.
- The college conducts extra classes for SC/ST/BC students in different subjects to enhance their skills and competence.
- Add on-courses and job-oriented courses also help them to meet the global needs of the time. For example: Functional English, Cosmetology, Food Processing, Fashion Designing, GIS and Remote Sensing, Web Designing, B. Voc Fashion Technology (One year Diploma), B. Voc Food Science & Quality Control (One year Diploma), and Community College (UGC): One year Diploma in Health Care.
- Computer literacy has been made mandatory for B.A./B.Com./B.Sc. 1st Semester.
- Communication Skills in English is given importance in order to help students from non-English medium schools.
- Students also interact with the teachers outside the classroom also, for their course related or general problems.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The College has various committees to deal with the above issues. It holds the tradition of imparting holistic education with emphasis on the ethical and moral principles. Gender, inclusion, environment etc., are devotedly addressed and handled in the college on all possible occasions. Being a Women's College, gender is always focused in all programmes and activities of the college.

I Gender Sensitization

• Gender sensitive issues are dealt by Women Development Cell, Red Ribbon Club, Red Cross Society, Legal Literacy, Student Council and Grievance Redressal & Sexual Harassment Cell. From time to time Talks, Human Chain, Street Plays, Extension Lectures, Seminars, Workshops are arranged to sensitize the students.

II Inclusive Growth

• The College always gave highest priority for promotion of education, skill development and giving an impetus to job opportunities to disadvantaged section of the societies, particularly students coming from SC, BC and Minority communities. Conscious targeted tasks were undertaken to promote the enrolment of students from socio-economically deprived sections of the society. Anti-ragging Cell is active in our college. **Though, no such case has been notified so far.**



III Environment Conservation

• There is a proactive participation of students and staff in **environment care and conservation**. The Awareness Programme on Environment is mandatory for all graduates. For the first year students, it is a **mandatory Qualifying** Exam taken up by the affiliating University.

The following activities indicate the sensitivity to Environment Conservation: **Go Green**: Taking efforts to plant and nurture more trees, Green Drive by planting more trees, is taken up by Eco Club, NSS volunteers especially during their camps or otherwise throughout the year.

Vermi-Composting: Zoology Department has organized Vermi-compost Workshops to help the farmers of the city.

Enrichment Programs: Poster Making Competition and Slogan Writing Competitions are held to promote "Keep the Environment Clean"

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Identification of advanced learners is done by their interactions in the class rooms, ability to comprehend and assimilation and performance in class test, term-end and semester examinations. Based on their performance, students are identified as slow and advanced learners. They are provided with the additional time, learning materials and assistance from the teachers. Further such learners are motivated for higher seats of learning and top most career options. A number of motivational lectures are organized to channelize their potential to accomplish better success.

Facilities to Advanced Learners:

- Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in Quiz Competitions, Class Seminars, Workshops, and Exhibitions.
- Informal counseling is provided by individual teachers on and off the class rooms.
- Groups are divided among meritorious and weak students. Special attention, assignments and coaching is given to such students.
- Special guidance by individual teachers through Assignment Work, Solving Question Paper, Group Discussion, Seminars, etc.
- UG/PG students are guided by their respective teachers about the Reference/Additional books to study from the Library.
- Central lab to help out the advance learners for research aptitude in Biotech Department.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

After the Sessional Exams, each subject teacher prepares the Mark List and evaluates the students' performance. Students are graded as Advanced, Average and Slow Learners.

- Slow Learners are given special care, motivational /extra classes. Physically Challenged students are dealt accordingly. The college takes following active steps to gauge their academic performance.

- Attendance is monitored by the subject teacher. The student who is absent continuously from the class is contacted by the subject teacher telephonically for the reason of absence. In most of the cases, the reason is marriage/pregnancy/critical illness.
- Free books are provided by the Book Bank and other library facilities are given to check the dropout rate.
- Married girls are given Maternity and Medical Leave to assist them to continue their studies.
- Students are counseled separately by the faculty when absent for more than a week without information.
- The major/sensitive reasons of the concerned students are dealt separately in Advisory Committee Meetings.
- Fines are exempted by analyzing their financial status.
- Scholarships, stipends, financial aids are given to check the drop rate. Free uniform is also provided to sports students/NCC/Community College etc.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The Academic Calendar is released by the affiliating University and is followed in totality by our college. It is further supplemented by the college teachers- as per department wise and as per Society/Club wise. Thus a judicious mix of curricular and co-curricular activities is aimed at for the allround development of the students. The Activity Calendar is published in the College Prospectus and College Website before the beginning of the academic session. It provides plan for the academic year to students, teachers and parents. Time Table is prepared and displayed on the notice board. Change in syllabi or examination schedule is notified to faculty as well as the students by the Examination Cell. Each department functions according to the Teaching plan prepared at the department level. The departments also carry out internal assessment (20% of the total marks as per university guidelines) based on student's class test performance, assignments and punctuality at the end of each semester. The final evaluation of students is done according to the University schedule. Towards the end of each session/semester, theory and practical examinations are conducted by the University and evaluation is carried out. The exam results are declared and Detailed Mark Cards are issued by the affiliating University.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching -learning process?

- The IQAC plays a key role in creating learner-centric environment by planning and monitoring of all the academic activities. It maintains the internal efficiency of the college. - N.C.C and N.S.S celebrate 15th August (Independence Day) and 26th January to inculcate national integration feeling among them.
- N.S.S organizes 07 days camps to sew many abilities among students
- H.Sc Department organizes Diwali Mela by selling diyas and rangoli colours, etc. to inculcate marketing ability and entrepreneurship.
- Fashion Designing Department organizes Annual Fashion Show to provide a platform to the girls for showcasing their creative skills.
- Science Department organizes quiz competitions through Marie Curie Club to establish scientific skills. Science Exhibitions, Collage, Poster Making Competitions are held .Workshops, to promote small scale industries are organized in collaboration with MSME.
- Projects and Project Files are prepared by Commerce/ Science / Arts students as per requirement of the syllabi.
- Regular visits to scientific research centres like NDRI, DWR, ICAR, Banks etc.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The use of modern multi-media teaching aids like OHP, internet enabled computer systems are usually employed in class room for instructions as well as other student learning experiences.

• Spoken English and Communication Skills are enhanced by computerized Functional English Lab.



- Mobile Boards, Projectors and visualizers are used as teaching aids which can be moved wherever required. We also use You Tube/PPT for elaborative and descriptive way of teaching. Internet with wi-fi for teachers and students is provided in each departmental lab.
- Some of the Departments, Administrative Office are equipped with scanners, printers and photocopiers.
- EDUSAT facility was provided to the students.
- E-library facility is there in the Library. Computerized Catalogue is used for the help of location of the book. Various competitive magazines, newspapers, employment news, text and reference books are available in the Library.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The college conducts Lectures by Experts from value academia. **State/National/International** level Seminars, Extension Lectures and Workshops are organized on various issues in which faculty members and students are encouraged to participate and reap benefits.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefited) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

The college teachers really act as beacon light and a guide for the students. Academic, personal, psychological, economical needs of the students are dealt by college faculty or through various clubs and societies.

Academic Support:

Orientation programme is organized in the beginning of the session to orient the girls about various support systems, scholarships, free-ships. Books are provided from Book Bank to financially weak students. Career Guidance and Placement Cell helps in placement of the students by providing them counseling. Extra coaching is given to help the weak as well as the meritorious students. Lectures on personality development and communication skills are continuously organized in the college. Students are exposed to advanced knowledge through seminars, extension lectures, and workshops by the experienced personalities from academics.

Personal Support and Guidance:

Principal, faculty and Department of Psychology in particular provide personal counseling and financial support to the students informally. Hostel students are also best counseled by the Hostel Committee as well as the warden. Apart from this, Women Development Cell, and Grievances Committee also support the students personally. Social personalities like IAS, IPS are invited to sensitize the students. Under the Women Development Cell



special lectures were organized for the students by the Police Department and helpline numbers (1091) was provided.

Professional Counseling:

Career and Placement Cell and all the faculty members give constant professional counseling to the students in the workshops, seminars, talks and classes.

Psycho-social Support and Guidance:

Such problems are dealt very sensitively either by faculty members, Department of Psychology or by Women Development Cell. At times, severe problems are dealt by the Advisory Committee.

No. of students benefited: Almost all the students of the college are benefited academically, psychologically and at personal level.

- 1. Library records and services are completely computerized for easy access and speedy transactions.
- 2. It is well stocked and well organized with latest books and journals on various subjects from general to Text, Reference Books, Encyclopedias, important Periodicals, Newspapers, etc.
- 3. Orientation Programme organized regularly. Information regarding facilities of library is given to newly enrolled students.
- 4. Open Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) system.
- 5. The Library has a Reading Room with a capacity of 150 students at a time.
- 6. Open Shelf Reference Section.
- 7. Member of INFLIBNET N-list programme, EDUSAT Program coordinated by UGC.
- 8. Library timings for students are from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- 9. Book Bank facility for SC/BC/Meritorious students.
- 10. Various CD-ROMs available for reference.
- 11. A number of books for preparation of various competitive exams like Civil Services, UGC/NET/SLET, Banking, MBA, MCA, Railways, MAT, CAT, and Hotel Management, etc. are also available.



- 12. Exhibition of Books.
- 13. Old recreational and competitive magazines are sold to staff and students at the end of the session.
- 14. Suggestion box installed in the library. The valuable suggestions provided in this process are analyzed by the Library Advisory Committee to implement worthy suggestions.
- 15. Internet, photostat, printing and scanning facility.
- 16. Newspaper clippings are filed for record.
- 17. University examination question papers are maintained for record year wise.
- 18. Students can access internet in the Library. Students are also instilled with reading habits among them by the faculty

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes, due to semester system very less time is allotted to complete the curriculum but the faculty manages to complete the curriculum within the stipulated timeframe. The faculty manages to successfully deliver their responsibilities. However, when completion of curriculum becomes an issue, the same is resolved by:

- 1. Engaging extra teaching classes.
- 2. Extending teaching hours by the individual teacher to complete the teaching assignment.
- 3. Effective implementation of planned lesson schedules.
- 4. ICT enabled teaching for quick understanding of the curriculum.
- 5. If the faculty finds that syllabi prescribed by the University are not synchronizing with the students, a written request is sent to the parent department or members of Board of Studies at the University level.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

It is planned in the following way:

- Teaching Plan of the prescribed University syllabi is prepared by the faculty and reviewed by the Head of all teaching departments of the college at the beginning of the session.
- A mid-semester or mid-term meeting is held by every department to take a review of the progress of teaching and to find out the problems, if any. Any lacuna left, is monitored by the HOD, from time to time, in their respective departments. Extra work is fuelled by the department whenever required.
- Syllabi completion certificate is submitted to the HOD by the faculty of the department at the end of every session.
- Feedback is collected from the students at the end of every academic year.
- Internal Assessment is based on the regularity of the students' Attendance, Assignments, Quiz, Seminars, Projects and Sessional Examination. After evaluation by the faculty, it is sent to the University.
- Result of all the students are analyzed by the respective departments and filled up in the prescribed Proforma of the college.



2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

The college follows the norms fixed by the University, UGC, DGHE, State Government. It strives to recruit and retain teachers who are competent, experienced and experts in their respective field of study. The college is always ready to absorb the best teachers available.

There are categories of teaching faculty in the college:

i) **Regular**-The regular posts are permanent and are appointed through Government/UGC norms .The selection is on pure merits.

ii) **Contractual**- Contractual faculty is appointed by the parent department including an expert from outside. The posts are for Unaided/Self-Finance courses. We get the experienced and competent faculty for the same. Many of them have been continuing for years in their post. We also encourage our alumni to join as staff members.


iii) **Guest/Visiting Faculty-** Professionals/Researchers are appointed as Guest Faculty and continue to guide us as experts.

Regular teachers are recruited as per Govt. norms. All the interviews are conducted at DAV College Managing Committee Office, New Delhi. Advertisements are made in National Newspapers, DAV Managing Committee Website, and College Website in order to reach the best teachers available in the state or other states of the country. After getting applications, the eligible candidates are scrutinized and merit list is prepared as per the guidelines issued by the Kurukshetra University and State Govt. Thereafter, the Managing Committee applies to the affiliating University for a panel of experts to conduct the interview. This expert panel consists of the following members:

- Two Subject Experts deputed by the Kurukshetra University.
- One VC Nominee
- One DGHE Nominee
- President of the College Management Committee
- Principal of the college



2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

- The college conducts following programmes in emerging trends: B.Sc (CA), B.Sc (CS), B.Sc & M.Sc.(Biotech). The college sometimes faces scarcity of qualified staff for teaching the new programmes but since this is an old and renowned institution, we manage to get ex-faculty from university departments, research institutes etc. Resource Persons are invited to deliver lectures on particular topics pertaining to the interests of the students. The visiting faculty is remunerated as per UGC rules.
- Teacher centric facilities attract the teachers and best of the faculty from the surrounding area join our college. Seminars/Workshops/Extension Lectures are organized and arranged to bridge the gap.

2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

* Handling New Curriculum:

- University Calendar is followed for teaching.
- Some of our faculty members (Mrs. Jyoti Malhotra, Dr. Poonam Sharma, Mrs. Neelam Lamba, Mrs. Amarjeet Kaur, Mrs. Renu Mehta, Dr. Aashima Gakhar) are members of BOARD of STUDIES in Kurukshetra University in their respective fields. They play an active role in designing the new curriculum.
- Whenever there is a change in the syllabi, new text-books are bought in the Library and new teaching plan is prepared by the parent dept.
- Add-on courses (mentioned in prospectus) had been introduced to meet the global needs of the time. The syllabus of the course is designed by the parent department.

* Content/Knowledge Management:

• International/National/State level Seminars/workshops/Extension Lectures are organized and Guest/Extension Lectures are arranged to enhance the knowledge of the faculty and students.

* Selection, development and use of enrichment materials:

- The college subscribes to a number of Journals related to different disciplines.
- There is an access to INFLIBNET, EDUSAT as UGC Resource centre.
- The college publishes Magazine: 'Echoes' and News Letter: 'Sankalp' which relates all the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes, our institute gets the evaluation of the teachers done by students and external peers. Feedback received from students at the end of the academic session is critically evaluated and preventive/follow up steps initiated. At the end of every academic year, students give feedback of individual faculty members on their teaching skills on a prescribed format.

The feedback form mainly focuses on the various teaching skills of the faculty members like presentation, communication, knowledge, content covered, sincerity, commitment, innovative practices and laboratory work. If any faculty doesn't meet the benchmark on feedback, she is counseled for the future. Stakeholders like Alumni, parents also give their feedback regarding the college.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The Stakeholders of the institution are informed about evaluation process by giving general instructions:

1. By the Parent University:

- Rules and regulations are promptly communicated to the students through Prospectus and are also available in the college Library. Even the university also displays all the rules on the university website.
- The faculty members read the instructions even in the classrooms and copy of the same is also displayed on the students' notice-board.
- The students are clearly made aware of the eligibility conditions required to appear for the final exams.
- They are informed of the criterion of the internal assessment.



- Reforms which are made by the university from time to time are circulated immediately to the faculty as well as to the students.
- 2. By the College:
- During the inaugural speech to the students, the Principal gives basic information regarding evaluation process in the college.
- During classes, teachers keep on briefing the students regarding various steps involved in the process of internal assessment (sessional exams, two assignments, attendance along with practical exams).
- The faculty members are made aware of all information through Universities circulars and college notices.
- Assignments are evaluated for the purpose of awarding internal assessment. Attendance is also a criterion for internal assessment.
- Sessional Examination are conducted and evaluated to take the clear picture of the student's progress.
- Uploading necessary information on college website for the students, parents and other stakeholders.
- Examination Branch of the college displays information received from the University regarding exams and the same is displayed on student's notice board.
- For improving evaluation, class tests (oral/ written) are taken other than the University rules.
- We also make the students aware of their short attendance. The names of defaulters are displayed on the notice board.
- Medically ill or pregnant women, sports students and other Youth-festival are given relaxation in attendance.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The college is affiliated to Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra

The University has initiated various evaluation reforms:

- 1. Introduction of internal assessment system. For each subject, 20 marks are allotted internally by the subject teacher.
- 2. Introduction of table marking.
- 3. Computerized Hall ticket with photograph of the candidate.
- 4. Computerized sign chart.
- 5. Facility of re-evaluation.
- 6. Project and viva system introduced both in undergraduate and post graduate programs also help in the evaluation of students.
- 7. Reappears were allowed to appear in the exam till their graduation is done. Recently a new rule is added that a student will not be admitted to BA V semester unless semester I is cleared.
- 8. In 2014-15, university has added another rule that to pass each semester examination, 35% is basic requirement in each theory paper and 35% in sessionals.

The college has adopted various university reforms concerning evaluation:

- 1. Same pattern of question papers is used in house examination.
- 2. Class tests and unit tests are conducted to evaluate the performance of students.
- 3. Student centric learning is done through assignments, projects, seminars, practicals, Sessional examinations and presentation in classes.
- 4. As a reformatory step absentees during Sessional Examination and short of attendance are fined and allowed to take the semester exam to promote women education.
- 5. Students are not allowed to enter the Examination Hall in Sessional Examination with bags, books, mobile phones etc. Teachers on duty check/search the students before the commencement of papers. Same is followed in the University Examination.
- 6. Those students who do not submit their assignments timely are called telephonically.
- 7. In special case, there is a provision of taking Sessional examination by the students with the permission of HOD and Principal.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The University and the college have their own full proof mechanism to effectively implement any examination reform. Once a system comes into effect, the college cannot have different course from the one set out by the University. The college Examination Cell keeps track of all the developments in the University Examination operations and updates all the information sent by the University. Date sheet for Sessional exams is placed on the notice board well in advance.

The non-teaching staff use ICT resources and immediately downloads any information of evaluation by the University and display them on the notice board.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

University is the sole authority for implementation of reforms in examination and evaluation but faculty members who are a part of academic bodies of the university actively campaign for reforms.

I Formative Approach:

- 1. Oral tests, group discussions, and weekly test.
- 2. Classroom interaction, home assignments, students seminars, workshops, field work, industrial visits, project work and practicals.
- 3. The students excelling in these activities are appreciated by giving merit certificates and given due weightage in internal assessment.
- 4. The University holds the final semester examination to judge the caliber of the student. Summative assessment, the final assessment of performance at the end of any semester is external exam which is carried out by the University.



5. The evaluation is done by the examiners appointed by the University who are the college teachers and is done totally by external examiners.

The impact of the formative evaluation helps the teachers to decide on the teaching learning process. It helps us in guessing and determining on how the content is retained by the learner. It also helps to gauge the academic level of the students.

II Impact of Summative Evaluation:

- 1. Check on attendance of students has given a significant rise.
- 2. University exam results of our college have improved.
- 3. No of students admitted to PG courses have increased.
- 4. Mandatory EVS Exam has sensitized them to environment conservation.
- 5. Knowledge of ICT has made a drastic change in the learning of the students.
- 6. **Prize Distribution Function** is held annually to award the meritorious students and subject toppers.
- 7. **Convocation** is held once in two years to award the degrees to the pass out students.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightage assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

There is complete transparency in the internal assessment. The criterion adopted is as directed by the University. The college follows a combination of different aspects of evaluation. Beside written examination, student's attendance record, classroom interaction, creativity, home assignments, communication skills are also evaluated. In professional courses evaluation is based on Project Work and viva-voce to judge their depth of knowledge. The information is provided in the Prospectus as well on the website. The internal assessment is made by the faculty members keeping in mind the following aspects / factors of students' performance during the academic year:

- 1) Class attendance
- 2) Class assignments
- 3) Score in the Sessional Examination etc.

20% weightage is given per subject to each student on the basis of Sessional Examination, attendance, assignments. Discipline and participation in class-room activities is also acknowledged while preparing internal assessment.

- Weightage is given to the students who participate at University/State/National level in sports, NCC, NSS, Republic Day Parade, Science Exhibitions.
- Participation in co-curricular or extracurricular activities is given relaxation.
- Medical leave or maternity leave is also granted.
- Attendance of training at Industries/Institutions is also taken care of.

For instance:

• Ritu of BA III & Jyoti of B.Com III (2013) participated in various competitions like Debate, Declamation at Radio Mantra and also at University level.



- Shelja of B.Sc. III (2013) participated in Essay Writing Competition on Nuclear Chemistry at All India Level held by BARC, Mumbai and was awarded 4th Prize.
- Anu Dhonchak and her team of B.Sc. III (2013) won cash prize of 2 lakh rupees in Science Quiz Competition at State level.
- All sports students attending camps
- NCC cadets
- NSS volunteers

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The College aspires to have a transformational impact on students through comprehensive education by inculcating academic abilities, personal qualities, competence, confidence and excellence. The college has specified its graduate attributes clearly.

To attain these stated graduate attributes and goals into practice, the college emphasizes on the following curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular programmes.

- 2. Transparency in assessment and evaluation and organizing Extension Lectures and Enrichment Courses.

Co-curricular Activities:

- 1. Debates, Essay Writing, College Magazine: 'Echoes'.
- 2. ICT training and free access to ICT resources.
- 3. Industrial/Field visits.
- 4. Participation in Group Discussions/Workshops/Conferences/Seminars.

Extra-curricular (Extension Activities):

- 1. NSS, NCC, Blood Donation Camps.
- 2. Environment Conservation.
- 3. Physical fitness sports and games.
- 4. Alumni meet is organized and some of the alumni are honored because of their contribution to society.
- 5. Various other societies' activities



The college ensures that by the time the student finishes his/her education in the college, he attains all these specified attributes. The faculty members of the college work rigorously throughout the academic year to enable the students imbibe the valuable lessons by way of seminars, moral lectures, presentations and field work. The faculty sensitizes students towards inclusive social concerns, human rights, gender and environmental issues to make them **sensitive, sensible, useful and conscientious global citizens.**

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level? By the University

The final examination are conducted and controlled by the University. There is a provision for re-evaluation and is permitted on request. For this process, following instructions are followed.

- 1. Within fifteen days of receiving DMC (detailed marks certificate), a student can apply for re-evaluation by depositing the requisite University fees.
- 2. Re-evaluation fee is charged from the student and evaluation process is again repeated.
- 3. In case of discrepancy in question paper in University Examination i.e. unequal distribution of marks/ difference from prescribed syllabus/ faulty or out-of syllabus questions, a representation is immediately sent to the concerned University authorities, through the Principal.

By the college

- 1. The student is made clear about every grievance in her mind.
- 2. At college level, the answer sheets after evaluation of Sessional examination are shown to the students so that they can see their performances, rectify any mistake or discrepancy in the marks given, which is brought to the notice of the concerned teacher.
- 3. If the student is not able to appear in the Sessional Examination due to extra-ordinary circumstances, she is granted permission to take test again at the given time with the consent of the respective teacher, HOD and Principal.

The semester system has although created more problems than solving them. For instance:

- Declaration of late results by the university.
- Short of time for self-study for students.
- Short duration for teaching.

-Time constraints for various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes', give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

IQAC meetings are held to gauge the progress or the problem area and new methodology is drawn. Each department has its learning objectives based on University curriculum i.e. on minimum skills and knowledge and aptitude that must be acquired by the students during the course of program.

• At the beginning of the academic session, the Principal of the college



holds the Orientation Programme.

- Time-table is displayed on the notice board and syllabus is notified to the students in the class.
- Teaching plan is made by the faculty for each class.
- Attendance is monitored along with the Assignments and Sessional Examination.
- The results/outcome are assessed subject-wise and each department as well as the Examination Committee analyze the results and take necessary action to improve the results through various methods.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

- Performance of students is judged on the basis of internal class tests, Sessional examination, assignments which are conducted on the same pattern as the University semester exams.
- Attendance of the students is monitored by the Attendance Register which shows the performance of the students in the class.
- The progress of academic performance is communicated to the student in the classroom by individual teachers.
- Parents are informed about the performance of their wards (chronic cases and habitual absentee only).
- University results are analyzed.
- University merits are sorted out.
- Overall and department wise results are sorted out.
- Drop-outs, reappears and weak students are separated
- Each type of student: weak and meritorious students are given proper guidance to improve upon their results.
- The parents of the meritorious students are invited to the Prize Distribution function.


















2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

- A significant amount is spent on infrastructure to facilitate the students with most suitable infrastructure for the all round growth of students. Science and Arts Blocks have been constructed. New Hostel Block is in the pipe line.
- The departments are equipped with ICT and wi fi facility. The students are promoted and assisted by teachers to feel free to use internet.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

The courses run by college have both social and economic relevance. The college at the time of the admission provides counseling regarding the choice of options the students wish to opt. They are guided regarding the future prospects of various options. New programmes were introduced to meet the



global demand. Courses are designed to train students in emerging areas of study and acquire skills that shape today's economy. We have value-based self-financed job-oriented courses, Add-on-courses, etc. which prepare the students for jobs across the wide array of fields. - 1. Answer scripts of the Sessional Examination are shown to students for their betterment.
- 2. University results are reviewed by the respective departments and Examination Committee.

III Planning:

- 1. On the basis of the results and feedback, new planning is framed.
- 2. Timely Redressal of students' grievances.
- 3. After class tests/Sessional Examinations, students are given details of their strengths and weaknesses and are also told about the right pattern of answers.
- 4. Extra teaching hours are planned accordingly.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The institution has a clearly defined, set mechanism to monitor the learning outcomes. After the admission process is over, mentors and teachers try to understand each student individually. The overall performance of all the departments for implementing the activities to attain the objectives is monitored by the IQAC.

- 1. Attendance is compulsorily taken for every lecture as it helps to monitor student's academic activities.
- 2. The tests and assignments are corrected within a short duration and the marks are entered in work register.
- 3. Based on the participation in the class and the marks scored in the tests and assignments, the student level is judged by the staff member and appropriate action is taken.
- 4. Counseling and extra classes are given to slow learners. Parents of such students are called to meet their respective faculty member, if required.



5. The report regarding academic progress in monthly tests/House examination and their attendance is intimated to the parents of weak students.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes, the learning objectives are student oriented and planning is done in such a way so that it improves student performance. Continuous class evaluation is an effective tool for the teacher to plan her teaching.

- Overall performance of a student in written test, home assignments and other co-curricular activities is taken as an indicator for assessing the learning objectives.
- Students who are identified as slow learners are offered special treatment by the concerned teachers and departments. They are given special coaching and psychological counseling.

For example: In English we found that the girls are slow learners for the syllabi prescribed by the university, so the teachers adopted innovative ways of teaching them, i.e. showing Mahabharata and grammar through PPT, similarly taking the students to Functional English Lab for live usage of E-mailing and Internet as well as verbal transcriptions. This exercise improved the results of the students. Similarly other departments also conduct such classes.

- The advanced learners are provided with more questioners, extra books for home, etc. Faculty also helps them for higher studies. Guidance and counseling for career advancement and access to Department, Library, books and Journals are bestowed to such students.
- Though the University keeps on revising the syllabus, yet if the request is made to the parent department in the University for the revision of the syllabi, when the results are poor because of the curriculum, that is adhered.

3.1 Promotion of Research

The College has been recognized by UGC and DBT as a centre for undertaking teaching and training of students in Biotechnology. A sum of Rs. 66.00 lakhs had been allocated to the college for developing teaching and research facilities in Life Sciences. UGC sanctioned two Minor Research Projects to the Department of Botany (1995-97) and Department of Zoology (2005-07) which were successfully completed.



Special assistance from UGC, DBT is exclusively used for strengthening and up gradation of Research Laboratories, infrastructure, books and journals, computers and software, etc.


College had allocated Rs. 5.00 lakhs for this purpose during the financial year 2012-13.

The college has no provision to provide seed money; however the Membership Fee for any research body, Registration Fee along with TA/DA for participating in seminars/conferences/workshops and Publication Fee for publishing their research papers in reputed journals are allocated to the faculty members.

College allocates a sum of Rs. 2.00 lakhs/annum for purchase of chemicals and minor appliances to support student projects. **325** projects have been prepared by students from the session 2010 to 2015. Apart from the projects, the students have also prepared **39** science working models.





Although college has not devised formal systems and strategies for institute industry interface, however involved in institute – industry interacting for equipping the students with the latest in the industry for their better placement.

Our college works for the motive to make our students industry acceptable by inviting the experts from various specialized fields and consultancies. Thus required skills are provided to them to ensure their placement and success.

Consultancy Services

- a) The Principal, Dr. Reeta Sehgal, the Honorary Manager of 07 DAV Aided and Public Schools, is the incharge of all the accounts and day-to-day functioning, of these schools and provides consultancy.
- b) The Dept. of Psychology of the college strives to ensure the welfare of the students by providing them with emotional and academic assistance.
- c) Ms. Anjali Sharma (Psychologist) (2008-12) provided consultancy to the students and faculty of the college as well arranged campaigns outside (Navoday Vidyalaya, Karnal, etc.) on the issues like sex education and moral values.
- d) Ms. Neetu Sharma (Psychologist) (2013-15) apart from teaching also provides counseling to the hostel students which helps them to overcome difficulties in relation to academics like institutional environment, problems related to teaching and non-teaching staff, or other official problems or other issues like family stress, home sickness, change of



atmosphere/environment, negotiation, lack of concentration, depression, fearfulness, etc. They may face various personal or psychological problems.

- e) Consultancy in Health Care through Health Sector Skill Council, New Delhi, under the guidance of Ms. Mayurakshi Sarangi and Mr. Shamim Khan, along with Dr. Anita Chaudhary, Cordinator, Health Care (Community College, UGC), KVA DAV College for Women, Karnal and the team of doctors (Dr. Vandana Bhatia, Dr. Anita Agarwal, Dr. Arushi Chaudhaary) of Kalpana Chawla Govt. such as flood, earthquakes, and war sufferers, etc. During the last four years, many activities have been organized in the neighbourhood basties & villages.

The college has created a number of clubs and societies to track student's involvement in various social activities. The college regularly organizes such types of extension activities which are enlisted below:

- Organized programme for Anganwari workers and health workers to create awareness of Human Rights with special reference to Women and Children on Dec. 7, 2012.
- Four hundred students were involved in creating human chain to aware public in general against female foeticide on March 19, 2012.
- Eco-club organized tree plantation day in the Ambedkar Basti and apprised people about the benefits of tree plantation.



- Students in collaboration with NIFA participated in awareness program against AIDS on Dec 1, 2011.
- First aid Training was organized to help the person in crisis.
- Extension activities on burning issues like declining Sex- ratio, dowry death and Honour killing were organized in the Ambedkar Basti.
- Cleanliness drive is organized on every second day of October in Ambedkar Basti. Awareness campaign against various water born diseases was the main attraction of the villagers.
- Toy making, stitching, painting activities were demonstrated to village ladies to make them self dependent & self employed.
- Under 'Saksherta Mission' students taught rural children and women.
- In collaboration with District Police, self-defence tactics were demonstrated and crimes against women were discussed with the rural girls.
- Moral education was imparted to the women and children of Ambedkar Basti and village Daha Jagir.
- Self defence and crime against women: legal provisions were discussed in collaboration with district police.

3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the institution, comment on how they complement student's academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

Organization of such outreach programmes, inculcate confidence, convincing, skills, way of putting forth their view-point, valuing others opinion and building mass movement against social evils like dowry, female foeticide, etc. The participation in such programmes makes them socially acceptable and students enjoy affection and a good place in society.

To involve community in reach out activities, the problems are addressed in local language and 'Nukkad Nataks' on socially relevant programmes are organized. Based upon college initiatives, a success in Immunization Drive, Cleanliness and Health, Tree Plantation, Use of Green Manure in Agriculture has increased in the areas where such programmes are regularly organized. The college organized Anganwari and Health Workers Awareness Campaign to create alertness of Human Rights with special reference to Women and Children on Dec. 7, 2012 and a National Symposium on "Human Rights: Social Sensitivity" on January 31, 2015 to discuss human rights with special reference to women, dalits and the role of Khap Panchayats.



The policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure to facilitate effective teaching and learning is chalked out by Building Committee and Purchase Committee. To make the teaching effective and to meet the requirements of increasing strength of the students due to the addition of new courses, the existing infrastructure was improved and renovated with the construction of the Science Block, Audio-visual Room (01), and Conference Hall (01). In this block, on each floor one classroom is equipped with ICT facility. New block for Home Science and Commerce is under construction. The construction of another block for the Hostel is in the pipeline. All the classrooms and labs are well-equipped with latest equipments and furniture.

- Administrative Office with separate partition for each person having individual computer.
- **Staff Room:** The staff room which fulfills the daily needs of the faculty members has a Refrigerator, a Microwave, an Aqua-Guard, an Air-Conditioner, computers and hygienic washroom.
- Laboratories: The various labs like Home Science, Fashion Designing, Psychology, Science, Geography, Music (I) and Music (V) and Functional English are used throughout the day for conducting practicals, skilled development courses and workshops.



• **Multi-purpose Halls**: The College has three well-equipped multi-purpose halls which are used for the major events of the college. The facilities in each are given below:

- Auditorium SANKALP: The institution has a huge, state of the art auditorium, SANKALP with a seating capacity of 2000 people with green rooms, stores for costumes and stage property etc. Its huge foyer serves as a space for rehearsals and exhibitions. It is constantly used for academic functions, National and International Conferences, Cultural Programs for University and State level Festivals, stage rehearsals and interactive sessions of the students and the faculty with eminent educationists from India and abroad. It also has **two Seminar Rooms** with a seating capacity of 100 people each.

- Conference Hall: The fully air conditioned, Hi-Tech, and acoustically treated hall (62'x32') is fitted with the latest audio-visual facilities. It serves as a good place for intellectual pursuits and quests, ceremonies and celebrations etc. It has a seating capacity of 300 people.

- Audio-visual Hall: The huge seminar hall $(36^{\circ} \times 35^{\circ})$ with a seating capacity of 250 people offers a suitable place to smaller groups where they can meet for cultural evenings and competitions.

The college has Arts, Science and Commerce streams. All the streams have separate classrooms with good teaching and learning infrastructure. The highly committed administration ensures that the available infrastructure is optimally utilized. Our college has 14 rooms for Arts block and a huge Vocational Education Centre. This center comprises eight well-equipped laboratories fitted with latest equipment. It has two store rooms and a staff room for faculty.

Language Lab: The Automated Language Lab has the facility of voice recording, playback, One-on-One interaction etc. for language learning and enhancement of effective communication skills.

Sports

- The College has indoor and outdoor sports facilities like Basket Ball Court, Badminton Courts, Table Tennis, Fencing etc.

- Proper sanitation is also maintained in the college and hostel campus.



- The College shows a keen interest in the health of students and staff. Frequent medical check-up, Mega Health Camp, Blood Test and Blood Donation Camps are organized every year.
- Expert lectures are arranged on health care, yoga, personal care etc. The institution sponsors health awareness camps for the faculty and the students.

NSS

The NSS Unit of the college comprises of 219 volunteers. It has a well furnished office with computing and internet facility. A full-fledged NSS Unit functions in the institution and undertakes a number of social programs in the surrounding areas like Clean and Green Campaigns, Blood Donation Camps, Sanitation, Literacy Programs, Adult Education etc.

NCC:

The NCC Army Wing of the College comprises 53 Cadets and the NCC Air Wing comprises 17 Cadets. It has a well-furnished office with computing and internet facility.

Cultural Club:

The Cultural Club plays a vital role in inculcating the habit of active participation among students. It conducts various competitions like singing, Folk Songs, Devotional Songs, Group Songs, Debate, Quiz, Essay Writing, Painting, Mehandi and Rangoli. Fashion Show is also organized to promote social interaction. Students are also sent to other colleges to compete in these events. National festivals like Independence Day and the birthday of great personalities are celebrated by this club. Our College students also participate in Zonal and Inter-Zonal Youth Festival every year.


4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available

All these features have been added as a result of massive expansion programme for the fulfillment of the need of expanding number of students and the nature of activities. The college has a Health Care Centre. It has a visiting qualified doctor. She visits the college daily to address the minor ailments of the students. Arrangements for first-aid and medical care are available for the staff as well as the students inside the campus. In case of serious medical emergency, help is provided by shifting the ward to a nearby hospital.

1. Spaces for special units:

IQAC:

The IQAC plays a key role in planning and monitoring of all the academic activities. It is housed in the college campus. It provides the development and application of quality benchmark/ parameters for the various academic and administrative activities of the college. It assures internal quality by planning new courses at UG and PG Level, introducing more teaching aids to improve the teaching-learning process and encourage innovative practices, enhancing the infrastructural facilities in terms of space, equipment, laboratories, library etc. This cell monitors promotion, implementation and continuous improvement of innovations in Curricular, Co-curricular and extracurricular activities of the learner's knowledge, capacity and personality.



Grievance Redressal Cell:

The Convener, Student Council and other members of the unit are available to address the grievances of the students in their free time. The students can bring their problems to them directly or through the Student Council and can be sure of the redressal. All kinds of problems are resolved speedily.

Women Development Cell:

There is a Women Enlightenment Forum in the college. Students are regularly advised to make use of and get the help of this cell. It sensitizes the girls about problems faced by them. WDC organizes many workshops, lectures and competitions for the empowerment of the girls.

Career Guidance and Placement Cell:

The Career Guidance & Placement Cell is housed in the campus. It is constantly engaged in counseling and guidance of the students for their successful placements. The students are trained to suit the various needs of the industry. Time to time, talks from various experts about placement are being organized by the cell. Many students have been placed. Besides, arrangements are constantly made for the participation of the students in campus selections (job fairs) conducted by different colleges and organizations. The cell is available in their free time to listen to the various problems of the students and for counseling them as well.

Health Care:

The college has a Health Care Centre. It has a visiting qualified doctor who provides medical aid to the students. First aid kits are also available in the college and hostel campus. As far as hygiene is concerned R.O. and Aqua-Guard have been installed in all the buildings of the college and on every floor of the hostel. The College shows a keen interest in the health of students and staff. Frequent medical check-ups, Mega Health Camp, Blood Test and Blood Donation Camps are organized by different cells. Expert lectures by different specialized doctors are arranged on health care, yoga, personal care etc. The institution sponsors health awareness camps for the faculty and the students. In case of emergency, the help is provided by shifting the ward to a nearby hospital.

Canteen:

The college has a well laid out canteen to provide a warm and friendly environment to the students. They relax and enjoy the nutritious mouthwatering delicacies of our canteen in their free periods. The canteen is operated by a contractor who interacts with the Canteen Committee and provides the students and the staff with nutritious drinks and eatables.

2. Recreational space for students:

There is a Gymnasium and Yoga Centre for students. Apart from this, there is Reception room, a huge dining hall with a capacity to seat around 250 students and a recreational room where the boarders can watch movies, have parties and enjoy their leisure time. There is a spacious and well-furnished multiactivity common room for the students where they can relax in their free periods.



Recreational space for staff:

The college has a well-planned, well-furnished staff room with an airconditioned room, microwave, refrigerator, water cooler and computers. The staff room has study tables and cupboards for the teachers. Even the veranda outside the staff room is marked for teachers, an area where they can handle the problems of the students. Yoga and meditation is an annual feature to relax at the end of session.

3. Other Spaces:

Auditorium SANKALP: The institution has a huge, state of the art auditorium, SANKALP with a seating capacity of 2000 people with green rooms, stores for costumes and stage property etc. Its huge foyer serves as a space for rehearsals and exhibitions. It is constantly used for academic functions, National and International Conferences, Cultural Programs for University and State Level festivals, stage rehearsals and interactive sessions of the students and the faculty with eminent educationalists from India and abroad.

Conference Hall: (62'x32') This is fully air conditioned, hi-tech, and acoustically treated hall is fitted with the latest audio-visual facilities. It serves as a good place for intellectual pursuits and quests, ceremonies and celebrations etc. It has a seating capacity of 300 people.

Audio-visual Hall: (36'x35') This audio-visual hall with a seating capacity of 250 people offers a suitable place to smaller groups where they can meet for cultural evenings and competitions.

Garden: Lush green garden in front of Principal's Office as an incentives drive of Go Green.

Botanical Garden: Well-maintained Botanical garden with huge and myriad variety of plants and herbs for study.

Transport Facility: The institution has a bus and a Winger. Transport facility through booking is also available for departmental activities such as trips to places of academic interests and also for the various extension initiatives taken up by the faculty members and students of the college.

Tennis Court: The court (opposite to Science Block) is in the pipe line. The area is specified for it.

4.2 Library as a learning resource

Though library works as an autonomous body in a college but it always has an advisory committee to facilitate effective and smooth governance of the library. The committee is constituted annually. It provides directions for a structured and balanced growth of the library. It guides and gives required instructions for the benefit of student as well as institution. Allocation and utilization of funds are also approved by the library advisory committee. It consists of the following members:



- Principal
- Librarian
- Senior teachers representing different faculties.
- Some of the significant initiatives under taken by the committee:
- To make the library user-friendly it has been computerized with Ez-lib software. It is well stocked with latest 51666 text & reference books, 20 journals, 11 newspapers and 29 magazines on various subjects. These books and periodicals are well organized in 140 almirahs. Three computers are placed in library for efficient daily library work. These computers are also connected online with the software.
- College library has a Book Bank Scheme maintained on grants from the UGC for SC/ST/OBC and needy students.
- An **Open Shelf Reference Section** introduced for the students has been greatly appreciated and as a result the number of books issued has increased considerably.
- Smart cards with barcode label have been introduced for quick circulation among staff and students. It has enhanced work efficiency of library staff and saved time of the users as well.
- Photostat, printing and scanner facilities.
- Internet facility with 4 computers (UGC network resources centre) has been introduced for the students.
- Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is made available to the users to identify the status of availability of documents in the library.
- Teaching staff put their books demand list signed by their respective Head of Dept. to Library according to their requirement. Emphasis has been laid on purchasing reference books.
- Books are also issued to students on the basis of refundable security during examination.
- Magazines, newspapers and journals are issued to teaching staff for an overnight.
- The Library has been connected to INFLIBNET (n-list) programme UGC-INFONET.
- Well ventilated Reading and Reference Room.
- University Examination Question Papers are available for consultation by users.



We have also introduced open shelf section for the convenience of post graduate students and staff. Open shelf section includes reference books, general knowledge books, encyclopedias, atlas, dictionaries, thesaurus, biographies etc.

The library staff ensures that the information about any latest acquisitions /developments is communicated to students by displaying information on the notice board. We also place information regarding new job oriented courses, hobby column, vacancies, admission information for higher studies on the library notice board. Teaching faculty is also informed the same by notices/circular.

The library services have been computerized. All the routine work of library is being done online with the help of software.

In addition we also provide the service of downloading academic web content to the users. They are also given the facility of printing and downloading documents as and when required.

One terminal is made available to the users to identify the status of availability of documents in the library during the library timings. Library staff assists the users when required, especially first time user.



Annual sale of old magazines is conducted by the library for staff and students. Library also organizes book exhibition for staff and students. Famous publishers are invited in this exhibition. They exhibit their latest books in the exhibition.

The Library staff personally assists the physically challenged persons in obtaining specific books and other reading materials for reference.



4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/learning materials by its staff and students?


1. Teachers of our college act as resource person on EDUSAT programme of DGHE, Government of Haryana. Teachers participate in National Level UGC sponsored, DGHE sponsored seminars with their lectures prepared in the form of power point presentations.

Students are given facility to prepare their PPT whenever they have to represent the college for various competitions held in other colleges.

- 2. For effective teaching ICT resources like LCD, Multimedia, Smart boards are used for development of the teaching materials and the dissemination of knowledge and teaching in the classes.
- 3. Add-on Courses on Web Designing and GIS AND Remote Sensing have been started since 2013. The students are given lectures using power point presentations.
- 4. Students of our college are given small projects to develop softwares of their own under the guidance of abled persons.
- 5. Inter college competitions like Power Point Presentations are also held by the college to promote the use of ICT among students.
- 6. The website of the college is also updated on routine basis.
- 7. Lectures and invited talks are also delivered by the college teachers at various National Seminars.
- 8. Softwares have also been purchased for the various courses taught in the college.

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching – learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

- 1. College provides Wi-fi and internet facility to the students to access online resources in the library as well as in their departments. Laboratories are equipped with modern and latest computer system with continuously upgrading versions of the operating system and software.
- 2. Projectors are used for delivering lectures to ensure clear understanding of the concepts. Students are given assignments like seminar presentation and technical workshops are arranged.
- 3. The college provides its students an access to online journals.
- 4. Functional English Language Lab has also been set up for the students.
- 5. Audio-visual resources are available in library.



The college provides access to e-resources under UGC N-list programme for scholarly content with a facility of more than 83000 e-books and more than 3000 e-journals.

The College makes adequate arrangement for the maintenance and up-keep of the college infrastructure. The departments make budget and they put the proposal as per their requirements. The meeting of review committee is held time to time to monitor the purchase.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure facilities and equipment of the college?

The college has an active team to maintain and repair infrastructure facilities and equipments. The Principal, on the basis of the respective development plan, proposes the infrastructure augmentation which fulfills the needs of the concerned departments. Funds from UGC are properly utilized for college development. An effective monitoring system supervised through advisory committee that ensures the optimal utilization of the budget allocation.

1. The staff under the supervision of the concerned convener regularly maintains the laboratory equipment.



- 2. The internal stock verification and audit of various departments are done on regular basis.
- 3. The library also keep check on the books issued, returned, damaged or to be weeded out.
- 4. Plumbing, electrical fitting and repair of furniture are also carried out according to the complaints from various departments.
- 5. RO's are installed in the college for the use of staff and students. Servicing of the water purifier is also carried out timely.
- 6. The staff room is equipped with A.C. for the convenience of the staff members.
- 7. The Administrative Office and Principal's room is equipped with AC.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

Annual maintenance and repairs of the equipments is taken care by the college in a systematic manner. Special staff is deputed for their day to day maintenance and cleaning works. Regular calibration and maintenance of electrical fittings and equipments like computers, water pumps, taps and lift (etc.) is carried out. College has its own electrician, plumber, generator maintainer, carpenter and building contractor who are available all the day to provide service when required. But sometimes the odd situation arises due to power failure, in that situation problem is taken on priority basis and sorted out.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location for upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipments (voltage fluctuation, constant supply of water, etc.)

Proper and clear-cut spaces are available for sensitive equipments like generator, water tanks, water purifiers and scientific instruments. The college has three Transformers and three Generators with 65KVA, 45KVA, 25KVA. Proper stabilizers are available to meet voltage fluctuations. The college has installed online UPS for computer labs and for science labs. Separate water tanks are installed for each building. Supply of water from overhead water tank is available for 24 hours. Submersibles water pumps keep the water tanks filled. Sensitive equipments are maintained regularly by the suppliers or from their authorized service center.



5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for: Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections:

The students who belong to SC/ST, OBC & the economically weaker sections are provided every possible help during their stay in the college. The college offers liberal concessions in fee and facilities to the students besides the govt. scholarships.

Students with physical disabilities:

There is reservation for students belonging to differently-abled category or physically challenged students as per UGC notification. They are given special care & attention. The college ensures that infrastructure facility meet the requirement of the students with front seating arrangement on the ground floor for their classes, comfortable furniture, attendant facility, extra care during examination/sickness. Lift is installed in the new Science Block to assist such students.

Overseas students:

International students can apply for any course run by the college. However, at present no overseas student is enrolled with the college.

Students to participate in various competitions/National & International:

Information regarding such competitions is displayed on the notice board. Career guidance cell incharge is responsible for giving details to the appropriate students. Students are given guidance at all stages from filling up application, collecting data & training for presentation. Our college has various clubs & Societies like Eco-club, Quiz-club, Science forum, youth welfare society. Where the students are trained, motivated & encouraged to participate in various competitions held at national level. The institute also provides financial assistance (like TA, Refreshment etc.) to the participants for these competitions. Girl students are always escorted by staff members (according to no. of participants).

Medical assistance to students:

Our institution has special concern for the college students & staff.

- The college keeps on organizing check up camps (NSS, Red Cross Society and Women Development Cell) where local doctors, dentists, eyesurgeons visit and keep a watch on the health of students.
- Free medicines are provided as per requirement (First Aid etc.)
- The college has a tie up with local hospitals in case of emergency.
- The college as well as hostel is provided with R.O. purified water at different locations.
- Provision of Medical Facility/Doctor (P.T.).
- Provision of hygienically prepared food in canteen and mess.
- House Keeping and cleanliness are regularly availed.

Skill Development (Spoken English, Computer Literacy)

Regular personality development programs are conducted to enhance the IQ level and communication skills of the participants.

- Special classes and workshops are arranged for communication skill development amongst girls from rural background.
- Guest speakers from industry ,professional institutes are invited to provide regional and global employment opportunities to the students



- Add-on-Courses (Certificate/Diploma/Advanced Diploma) in Spoken/ Functional English has been introduced since 2007. There are 8 Add-on-Courses offered by the college for Skill Development.
- Computer Science is one of the compulsory subjects for all the first year students.
- Add-on-Courses in Animation, Web-designing & Multimedia has been introduced with effect from the session 2013-14.
- Degree courses like BBA, BCA, B.Sc. Fashion Designing, and B.Voc. and Community College are running successfully.

Support for "slow learners"

Slow learners are identified in the beginning of the session by faculty members. Extra classes are taken for weak students. Students with compartment in previous semesters are encouraged to attend these classes. Library support is provided through question bank and extension of library working hours during exams. Advance learners are attached with slow learners to help them. Class tests are frequently conducted to improve their learning.

Exposure of students to other institution of higher learning/corporate/etc.

All the departments depute the students to attend seminars/workshops/ quiz/science-exhibition/cultural festivals organized by other institutions. Entrepreneurship training is provided through pharmaceutical industry, MSME, NDRI, NBAGR, etc.

Placement/Consultancy Services are offered by the college for all the students. **Publication of student magazine**

Annual college magazine 'Echoes' provides the opportunity to the students to publish their contents/articles. The college magazine is printed in the supervision of college 'editorial board'. It is mainly divided into seven sections i.e. English, Hindi, Punjabi, Sanskrit, Geography and Home Sc. & Science. Each section has a staff editor as well as student editor. Biannual activities of the college are published in News Letter 'Sankalp' (December/January).

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skill, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

Employment/Career Guidance & Placement Cell of the college has been given the responsibility of promoting self employment. The students from Commerce & Management streams along with their faulty visit Co-operative & management institutes, banks, etc. Students from Science stream also visit pharmaceutical industries, NBAGR, NDRI etc. MSME is a regular visitor to the college and encourages entrepreneurship by providing knowledge on loans. They hold workshops to familiarize the students with production procedure and the cost involved. The students of Arts are also given similar training by the Departments of Home Science & English.

The Science Forum, Marie Curie Quiz Club, Hobby Club, Literary Association, Youth Welfare Society supervise the participation in various Science Exhibition, Quiz Competitions, Youth Festivals, Essay Writing Competitions, Debates at District & State levels. The students who participated in all these activities are provided with extra classes so that the time given by them for various activities can be compensated. They are given flexibility in attendance in lieu of practice & participation dates.

Diet of the sports person, during practice & competition is born by the institution as per the norms laid down by State Govt. /KUK. (Diet Rate: Rs.100 per day) Winners of the various competitions are awarded with Cash Prizes, Trophies Merit Certificates, Blazers, and Hostel Freeships, etc.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The college has various statutory bodies and general committees for the management of its affairs. The head of institution appoints the conveners and members for various committees. Official notice is issued along with guidelines defining roles and responsibilities of the committees. The HODs are given independent powers to implement schemes and to track regular progressions of the departments. The college has Advisory Committee and IQAC comprising of senior teachers for maintaining quality in the college. The college collects feedback from the students for the purpose of teacher performance appraisal.

6.1.5 Give details of academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The DAV College Managing Committee, New Delhi, plays a parental cum leadership role in the college. It is an inspirational body that encourages the Principal and the faculty members to develop innovative insights and incorporate them in their daily functioning for the advancement of the institution. Through open-ended discussions held during its meetings with the head of the institution and faculty members, the management motivates them to work towards the overall growth of the institution. Two members from the teaching staff and one member from the non teaching staff act as college representative in the Governing Body which takes decisions for the smooth functioning of the institute. The management gives permission for enrollment for PhD of faculty, new courses initiated by the faculty, new infrastructure for faculty and students, new posts and appointment of faculty and sanctions duty leave for research programmes.

The Principal is the pillar around whom the academic and administrative activities of the college revolve. An efficient and effective leadership is carried out through de-centralization in the form of setting up of various policy making bodies such as Advisory Committee, Examination Committee,



IQAC, Purchase Committee, Building Committee, UGC Committee, Student Council, Publication Committee, Discipline Committee, Anti-Ragging Cell, Career Guidance and Placement Cell, Grievance Redressal and Sexual Harassment Cell, Youth and Cultural Affairs Society, Women Development Cell, Legal Literacy Cell, Alumni Association, Sports Committee, Research Committee, NCC, NSS etc. These committees are comprised of faculty members, who hold periodic meetings and review the matters concerning their activities. HODs also involve their departmental committees to take their decisions regarding curriculum.

The college also offers various opportunities to students to help them develop their leadership potential. The formation of an elected Student Council in the beginning of the session goes a long way in honing leadership qualities among the students. Active involvement and participation of students in various clubs and societies, seminars, workshops, competitions, cultural programs organized by the college also enable them to develop their leadership qualities and competencies. The Principal encourages the faculty and the non-teaching staff in the following ways:-

- The Principal motivates all teaching and non-teaching staff to achieve their respective academic goals.
- The college sends its faculty members to attend Orientation Programmes/Refresher Courses held by various universities.
- The Principal motivates and encourages the teaching staff to update their academic qualifications by publishing research papers and taking up projects in order to enrich various academic, sports, cultural and extension activities.
- The Principal delegates the HODs with various responsibilities by giving them the power to function independently.
- The Principal always motivates the teaching and the non-teaching staff to face the myriad academic and administrative challenges and prepare for innovative thinking. (Criterion 6, Annexure II)

The Principal has de-centralized the activities of the college by delegating authority to the HODs of all departments, conveners/coordinators of various administrative committees, clubs and societies to work independently. They plan all the activities consulting other faculty members. Within the departments, clubs and societies, the teachers and students work in a cooperative spirit, helping and motivating one another by encouraging every individual to grow.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

The management grants permission for the perspective plans to be presented to the stake holders. The main issues regarding the policies are shared with the members of the faculty by the principal and open discussions take place. The performance of the students is reviewed after University exams and necessary action is taken to bring improvement. Special attention is paid to the meritorious students as well as weak students. The IQAC ensures that the college staff works diligently to achieve the desired results. The teachers are encouraged to participate in Seminars, Conferences, Workshops, Refresher and Orientation Courses to update their skills. Some of the departments have been provided separate rooms which are adequately furnished and equipped with the latest technology and gadgets to ensure quality work.

The college is propelled by a visionary management which has well-defined goals and perspective plans for carrying out the developmental work. 
- Completion of new building in 2013 for Science Block having 5 floors with lift facility, 18 classrooms, 12 labs, 5 stores, 4 staff rooms, 14 toilets, 1 computer lab, 1 dark room, 2 seminar halls, 1 conference hall and water-coolers with Aqua Guards on each floor.
- Completion of new building for Home Science Block having 5 floors, 10 labs, 22 classrooms, 2 stores, 9 toilets, 1 staff room, canteen, common room, bookshop, gymnasium and health care centre in the basement.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organization structure and decision making process?

The College has a democratic set up where each unit is given full freedom to work out its innovative plans for development. The hierarchical order is maintained and there is internal coordination and harmony among the various units/cells of the colleges. The powers and the functions of each authority and body are well-defined to ensure administrative decentralization. The IQAC constitutes the major inputs for perspective planning taking care of the educational needs and demands of our nation. The academic goals are set through collaborative efforts of the various components of the institution. Then responsibilities are assigned to the departments and their individual teachers. The HODs and Conveners of administrative committees, clubs and societies play a significant role along with the principal in monitoring the progress of the work. Under the intensive mentoring by the administration the goal is achieved by the dedicated efforts of the faculty. Ultimately, all the administrative and the financial activities are reviewed by the Administrative Committees and auditors to ensure administrative and academic accountability of the system.

Teaching & Learning

The Management ensures effective and efficient execution of the teaching learning process by:

A. Recruiting highly qualified and competent teaching faculty.



B. Promoting professional development of the faculty by providing them the following support:

- To attend refresher courses and orientation programmes.
- To equip them in using modern pedagogical tools e.g.(OHP, Interaction boards, PPT, Smart boards etc)
- To encourage them to pursue research programmes.
- To attend and organize National and International Seminars.
- By replacing faculty proceeding on leave with substitute teachers to ensure quality teaching.
- By providing state-of-the-art infrastructure conducive to intellectual growth and all-round development of both the faculty members and the students.

The review of the academic results, mutual sharing and consultations among the faculty members, along with soliciting the regular feedback from the students enable the teachers to keep improving their teaching strategies. New methodologies are developed to make the learning experience for the students interesting and stimulating.

• A close watch is kept at the learners' progress so that they remain alert and learn fast. When they perform well, they are given incentives in the form of token prizes. This keeps the spirit of healthy competition alive among the students.

Research & Development

The college has established a Research Development Committee to promote research aptitude among faculty and students. They also keep records of the major and minor research projects and assignments taken up by our teachers. The Principal motivates the faculty to write research papers for publication. Seminars/ Workshops/ Conferences/ Symposia are organized regularly to promote research.

Community Engagement

The college believes in strengthening its ties with the community, be it parents, professionals, general public or the less privileged citizens. Through its various components, naming a few, NCC, NSS, Red Cross, and Arya Yuvti Sabha, the college has developed meaningful new programmes and schemes to develop a healthy relationship with the society. The college has 2 units of NSS and NCC. The college encourages students to take part in NCC, NSS and other extension activities etc. Comprehensive projects are undertaken by the students in collaboration with the community to bring in a sense of self-worth and participation in nation building.

The college organizes various outreach programmes to enable the students to respond to the larger issues of society. The college contributes to community in the following ways:-

- Tree Plantation Drives are organized.
- Blood Donation Camps are organized.
- Visiting Valmiki Bastis to educate them.
- Awareness rallies and street plays are organized to bring awareness regarding social issues.
- Recently under Community College Scheme of UGC, Diploma in Health Care has been started in 2014-15 which directly connects the college with society and empowers girls from weaker sections of our society.

Human resource management is a very sensitive area where the college adheres to the principle of rigorous discipline but with a warm human touch. The institute has a very effective mechanism for assessing adequate human power requirements, staff recruitment, monitoring and obtaining feedback on staff. The administration has developed mechanisms to watch each and every employee closely, at the same time it takes care to keep them at a comfort level, so that they can work efficiently to the maximum of their capacity.

Industry interaction


For Professional and Vocational Courses, an active and participative approach is adopted by the College vis-à-vis the industry. The placement cell along with various departments of the college remains on its toes to develop ties with industries at the local, regional and national level. The suggestions from the industry are incorporated in the various courses of the college to meet the demands of the industry. Collaborative efforts are put in by involving various industries and research organizations like Panipat Thermal Plant (Panipat), Leather Industry (Gharunda), Rice Mill Industry (Karnal) NDRI, DWDR, MSME, Ashwani Knitting Techniques (Ludhiana), various Hospitals in Karnal etc to hold training/internships, seminars, lectures, workshops and symposia regularly. The students are given exposure through various industrial visits and field trips which are organized from time to time by all the departments. Students are sent for placement meets organized by various technical industries. In order to increase the employability of our students, we also arrange for their training in various reputed industries related to their field of study. (Criterion 6, Annexure VI)

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Head of the institution, who plans, implements and monitors all the institutional programmes along with the various academic & co-academic bodies, keeps in touch with the management through correspondence & presentation of reports in management meetings. She also asks for written reports of the growth of the institution and its achievements in various fields, term-wise and annually. College publications, like News bulletin, information brochures, emails, newspaper reports too keep the information channels open with the stakeholders.

The Head of the institution ensures that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the management in the following ways:

- a) By holding periodical meetings to review the overall progress of the institution.
- b) Through personal interactions with students at both formal and informal level.
- c) Through personal interaction of the Principal with the faculty and non-teaching staff.
- d) Through interaction of the principal with the guardians.



- f) Through reports of parents' interactions with the teachers.
- g) College Website <u>www.kvadav.com</u> keeps updating the college activities on the site.

The management and head of the institution are always in interactive mode with each other. The head of the institution gets the feedback from various stakeholders like teachers, students, parents and alumni with regards to the teaching quality, curriculum, extra-curricular activities and infrastructural requirements and communicates it to the members of the managing committee. After thorough discussions and deliberations, the existing facilities and activities of the institution are reviewed and decisions are taken for their implementation. The available resources and modalities are also considered thoroughly through meetings with HODs and experts.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage & support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness & efficiency of the institutional process?

The college Management is dedicated towards providing a plethora of opportunities to all staff members to develop their competence and capability that enables them to have a competitive edge and achieve the objectives of the institution efficiently and effectively. There are 2 Teaching and 1 Non-Teaching member nominated in the Governing Body of the College. These members interact with the management on behalf of their members and place before the committee any issues to be resolved. At the time of appointment, each employee is handed over an appointment letter stating his/her responsibilities and the code of conduct. The Head of the Institution conducts an orientation programme in the beginning of each academic session to give comprehensive instructions regarding the new programmes and projects to be undertaken by the college. During the academic session, the official visits by the members of the Managing Committee enable them to interact with the staff and apprise them of the goals and objectives of their various programmes. This interaction brings the much desired efficiency in the working of the institution.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolution made by the management council in the last year & the status of implementation of such resolution.

Prof. in Music Vocal) and Ms. Monika Saini (Librarian) was resolved, subject to the approval of the DGHE Haryana.
- The matter regarding grant of increments on account of M.Phil/Ph.D. to respective aided staff members- Ms. Anuradha (Asstt, Prof. in Pol.Science), Ms. Swati Sharma (Asstt. Prof in Music Vocal), Ms. Renu Baliyan (Asstt. Prof. in History), Ms. Monika Saini (Librarian), Ms. Kanwaljeet Virdi (Asstt. Prof. in Geography), Dr. Sunita Devi (Asstt. Prof. in Hindi), Dr. Punam Kundu (Asstt.Prof. in Economics), Dr. Deepti Sharma (Asstt. in English), Dr. Suman (Asstt. Prof. in Physical Education), Dr. Nadia Chauhan (Asstt. Prof. in Botany) was resolved, subject to the approval of the DGHE Haryana.
- The matter regarding the grant of selection grade to Mrs. Sanjana Raheja (un-aided), Assistant Prof. in Commerce was resolved.
- The matter regarding the request for starting of PG Diploma in Fashion Designing was resolved, subject to financial viability.
- The matter regarding introduction of following new UGC courses- B.Voc in Fashion Technology, B.Voc in Food Science and Quality Control, Diploma in Health Care was resolved. It was noted that the college received UGC grant of Rs. 1.85 crore for the same.
- The matter regarding outsourcing of all class IV jobs and housekeeping through an agency by the Principal was resolved.

Our College is affiliated to Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra and there is no provision for autonomy. The management has also not taken any decision regarding this.

6.2.9 How does the institution ensure that grievances/complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there any mechanism to analyze the nature of grievance?

The Grievance Redressal and Sexual Harassment Cell of our college consisting of senior teachers works actively throughout the year. The committee directly deals with the students and their parents if there is any complaint.

They sort out their problems with the help of the faculty members. If need be, the complaints are referred to the principal for necessary action. Viable solution to the problem is found out immediately. The convener of the Grievance Redressal and Sexual Harassment Cell interacts individually with



the complainants and after analyzing the nature of their grievances makes suggestions accordingly.

The Grievance Redressal Cell deals with the problems of the staff also. For example four contractual employees of the college Mr. Dinesh, Mrs. Kamlesh, Mrs. Anuradha and Mr. Bhupesh were not signing the attendance register. A meeting was held in the month of January 2015 by the convener of the cell Ms. Vijay Bhatia in the presence of all the committee members. All these employees were advised that they were getting salary as per the Govt. rate. The outcome was positive as Mr. Dinesh and Mrs. Kamlesh started to sign the registers. Mr. Bhupesh was suspended.

6.2.11 Does the institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes' what was the outcome & response of the institution to such an effort?

Our institute has always followed a democratic set up and the feedback given by the students is always valued & analyzed properly. Sometimes we receive feedback through the teachers. The students have an open access to the Principal. In the meeting of the Advisory Committee, these issues are discussed; necessary steps and measures are taken for improvement. In the recent years, we tried to facilitate the students on their demands in the following ways:

- Due to initiative taken by the College, special bus service by Haryana Roadways is provided to the students coming from distant villages.
- Extra classes for weak students are arranged in the premises of the college
- Part-time doctor is appointed by the college for hostel students.
- Beauty services are made available on the campus at nominal charges, both for faculty members and students.
- Book shop cum Tuck shop with stationery items and other tit bits.
- There is a Diet Clinic named "Diet Insight" where customized diet plans are provided free of cost to staff members and students as well as hostellers.
- Workshops/Seminars/Demonstrations lectures/ Mock Interviews are arranged for final year students.

6. 3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching & non-teaching staff?

As the Management and the Principal believe in maintaining a staff-friendly environment they motivate the faculty by providing the necessary infrastructural facilities that address the professional & research needs of the



teaching faculty. All the members of the staff have access to computers with internet facility. A Central Lab is available for research. Every year, many teachers are given permission to attend the Orientation Programme and Refresher Courses organized by various universities for the up gradation of their skills and knowledge. The principal identifies the individual strengths, areas of interest of the faculty and accordingly assigns them responsibilities. The College also takes care of the costs incurred. So the authority protects the freedom of the individual and appreciates their innovations and thereby motivates them. The institute encourages departments and faculty members to conduct Seminars, Extension Lectures and Workshops internally. The college library is enriched by adding new books and journals every year.

Developmental programs are also organized for the staff in the form of Workshops, Conferences, and Seminars so that the staff is encouraged to take up research, do higher studies and thereby improve their professional abilities. The non-teaching staff, involved in administrative work like fee section, accounts section is also skilled in computer technology and we have a computerized office with software catering to their needs. The college sanctions duty leave to the faculty members for participating and presenting research papers in National/International/Seminars and Conferences.

Computer training is provided to all administrative staff. Technical guidance and training is provided by teaching staff.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institute for faculty empowerment through training, re-training & motivating the employees for the roles and responsibilities they perform?

There is a mammoth growth in this field. A conducive work culture with time to time encouragement and opportunities for growth enables staff to make the best use of their capabilities. The college provides all the latest infrastructural facilities which serve as an aid in effective teaching-learning process, so as to make the students grasp and understand thoroughly their respective subjects. All the departments have latest computers. We have smart boards, projectors and multi-media to support the faculty activities. Most of the college has Wi-Fi connectivity, i.e., administrative block, principal office, library, hostel, various teaching departments etc. Moreover several National/International Seminars/Workshops/Extension lectures cum Demonstrations are organized to give exposure to the faculty and students. The principal always encourages the teachers to take up research projects and take part in Workshops/Seminars, Awareness Programs on Legal Rights, Human Rights, Health related issues held in other colleges also. The faculty members are motivated by giving duty leave to encourage paper presentations in National and International Seminars organized by various Universities and Colleges.

Teaching staff is also encouraged by acknowledging and appreciating their achievements in annual functions of the college.

6.3.3 Provide details on the Performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The Principal receives Annual Confidential Reports of the teachers at the end of every session. This report is comprehensive and includes the teacher's academic and research related achievements, contribution to the various



committees and clubs in the college, participation in in-service training programmes, Workshops/Seminars, etc. So through this report, multiple facets of the individual's contribution towards the institution and their work throughout the year are assessed thoroughly. The principal evaluates the performance and gives grading according to the work performed. Meetings are conducted with the staff individually and their performance is reviewed. The teachers are motivated to take up developmental programmes. The achievements of the faculty members and the students are published in the Annual Magazine of the college. The Best Teacher Award is given to encourage research among the faculty members.

Students' response through Feedback Proforma throws light on the performance of individual teachers.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The Performance Appraisal Report/ Annual Confidential Report duly filled by the faculty members is assessed by the Principal and reviewed by the Management. The Management plays an active role in the performance appraisal of the teaching and the non-teaching staff. Annual increments and placements in the grades are implemented under the signatures of the Managing Committee as per the rules of DGHE and affiliating University, KUK. Likewise, the management ensures timely grant of benefits and grades after the appraisal of the faculty. The decisions taken in the meetings of the Governing Body are implemented regularly.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years.

The institution has made provisions for several welfare schemes for the teaching and the non-teaching staff to increase their productivity.

- Fee concession to wards of staff members.
- Duty leave is provided to teachers for attending Workshops, Seminars, Orientation and Refresher Courses.
- Six months maternity leave is provided to expecting mothers.
- There is a provision of advance against salary to the members of teaching and non-teaching staff as and when required.
- Loan from GPF for staff (in case of any adversity).
- In case of emergency, if somebody gets hurt in the college, the college compensates financially to some extent.
- Uniforms are provided to IV class employees every year.
- Campus accommodation for a few IV class employees.
- Excursion tours and picnics for faculty and students.
- There is a facility of Holiday homes by KUK at different places.
- Cosmetic services are available for staff and students at nominal charges.
- There is a Diet Clinic named "Diet Insight" where customized diet plans are provided free of cost to staff members and students.



- Health Counseling is provided to staff members as and when required. The • college organizes lectures on issues pertaining to health and hygiene by inviting senior doctors of the town.
- Lunch is available for staff members in the hostel mess at a nominal cost.
- Relaxation in timings on health ground.
- Facility for research in Central laboratory.
- Meditation programmes like Vipassana are organized.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the institution for attracting & retaining eminent faculty?

The College gives pay scales as per the UGC rules & security of service is assured to the faculty & other staff who have desired qualifications, knowledge and skill. Well-qualified faculty as per the criterion of the UGC, KUK and the Haryana administration is appointed. Those who are employed on contractual basis are offered handsome salaries keeping in mind their experience and qualifications. The institution accords fair treatment to aided and un-aided/ self-financed faculty in terms of sharing of administrative responsibilities and representation in committees. Sometimes the college seeks the services of the retired teaching faculty as guest faculty to take benefit from their experience.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What are the institutional mechanisms to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

Before financial year a budget is prepared for every account held by the college which is presented to the Management Committee. It helps in judicious allocation and effective utilization of finances under each head. The college has four main accounts. The institution is efficient in planning development strategies and making optimum use of resources. Both the teaching and the non-teaching staff comprise of the financial committees like the Accountant, Bursar and Purchase Committee. The requirement of books, equipments, furniture, instruments and maintenance etc is given by the HODs which are finally approved by the Principal. The Purchase Committee invites tenders and quotations from different agencies and the ones offering the best bargain are given orders to purchase.

As per the need of each department of the college, the funds are allocated or grants are applied for as per UGC schemes for infrastructure developmental projects by the college. The college income and expenditure accounts are regularly maintained and are monitored by the administrative office. Strict policies are followed by the institution regarding expenditure. Internal and external audits are conducted regularly to ensure transparency in accounts.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was last audit done and what were the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The institutional mechanisms for internal and external audits are systematic. A well-qualified chartered accountant is appointed by the Management Committee to take care of the financial issues. Internal Audit is conducted regularly by independent auditors appointed by the Management. External

auditing is undertaken by the office of DGHE (Govt.) and AG teams. The last internal audit was done in the financial year 2014-15 whereas the last external audit was done in the year 2013-14. There were no major objections raised by the auditors. Minor objections were rectified.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/ funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund available with institution, if any.

The major sources of institutional income are the funds generated from college and hostel fees, rental income from the shops and bank. 95% grant is received from DGHE (Haryana) for the aided staff and 5% is arranged by the college from its own sources. The deficit, if any in building projects is provided by the DAV College Managing Committee, New Delhi in the form of loan.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

(a) Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance process?

Yes, the college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell. We are inspired by Swami Dayanand Saraswati's vision of exploring the potential in women and the need to educate and empower them. The IQAC plays a key role in the planning and monitoring of all the academic activities. It provides a benchmark for the development and application of quality parameters for various academic and administrative activities of the college. This cell monitors promotion, implementation and continuous improvement of innovation in curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities of the college. The IQAC works towards the enhancement of the learners' knowledge capacity and personality. It plans for new courses for the next session. Some of the noticeable contributions of the IQAC are:

- Directing and monitoring the departments to hold meetings for planning teaching assignments, submission of teaching plans and periodic evaluation.
- To plan and execute specially devised programmes and activities that generates sensitivity towards society.
- Monitoring of results, analysis and identification of slow and advanced learners for further necessary action.
- The IQAC prepares Annual Reports to assess the tasks completed and devices improved methodology for the incomplete ones.
- Monitoring of schedules and overall teaching and evaluation of valueadded certificate courses conducted by different departments.
- Encouraging and assisting different departments to organize Workshops/Seminars/Extension Lectures under quality improvement program.
- Encouraging faculty members to opt for ICT resources.



- Monitoring collection of feedback and analysis of data obtained by the departments on course content and evaluation of teachers by students, parents and alumni.
- Collection of feedback from alumni for academic inputs.
- Planning of the new programmes
- Innovative practices adoption.
- To encourage planning and execution of new infrastructure.
- To encourage research development.
- Reviewing student's progression.

(b) How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/ authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

Some of the decisions of IQAC approved by the management are as follows:

- Commencement of new courses at UG level, i.e., BCA, B.Com (Advertising, Sales Promotion and Sales Management), B.Sc. (Non-Medical) (Unaided), B.Sc. (Fashion Designing), B.Voc. (Food Science and Quality Control), B.Voc. (Fashion Technology) and Introduced two new elective subjects, i.e., Psychology and Physical Education for Humanities students.
- Commencement of new courses at PG level, i.e., M.Sc. (Computer Science) and M.Sc. (Geography).
- Commencement of new Add-on Courses/Job-Oriented Courses and Diplomas, i.e., Functional English, PGDCA, GIS and Remote Sensing, Web Designing, Diploma in Health Care Management, Beauty Culture and Cosmetology, Food Processing, Fashion Designing.
- New Management post for Department of Computer, Department of Commerce etc.
- Purchase of vehicles- Buses/ Cars/ Vans.
- Construction of Science Block and Home Science Block.

All the decisions approved were implemented.

(c) Does the IQAC have any external member on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

No, the IQAC doesn't have any external member.

(d) How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

For effective functioning of IQAC, our students actively participate in various Clubs and Societies, Seminars, Workshops, Competitions, and Cultural Programs organized by the college.

The college offers various opportunities to students to help them develop their leadership potential. The formation of Student Council in the beginning of the session goes a long way in honing leadership qualities among the students. Informal interaction and feedback collected from the parents, students and alumni help us a great deal in overall enhancement of the college. Many of our alumni are working as the faculty of the college.

(e) How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?



The IQAC comprising of the faculty members of the college, formulates all the important strategies regarding quality control measures like improvement in teaching techniques, organization of Seminars, Workshops and Extension Lectures. These are further circulated to the concerned departments for further implementation.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its modus operandi?

Yes, to strengthen the education system and to empower our students to face global challenges, the college has developed an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. In the beginning of the academic session, the Principal organizes a meeting with the faculty to discuss various academic and administrative activities for the current academic session. In this meeting, the Principal comments upon the previous years' teaching learning procedures and applauds the teachers producing good results. Duties are assigned to the HODs and conveners of the various committees, clubs and societies. Members of the staff are made familiar with the latest academic calendar of Kurukshetra University Kurukshetra for the smooth functioning of day to day affairs. The up-to-date record of students is maintained by the college. All the instructions issued by UGC, DGHE and KUK are received by the Principal and circulated among the faculty. At the end of each academic year, the teachers submits their ACRs/APIs, Attendance Registers, Committee Reports and Course Completion Certificates for evaluation purpose.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the quality assurance procedure? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

The institution encourages the faculty to continuously upgrade their skills to impart knowledge in an innovative manner as well as to sensitize them to the societal needs. For this purpose faculty members are deputed to attend various Workshops/ Conferences/ Seminars/ Orientation Programmes/Refresher courses. The members of non-teaching staff are given computer training from time to time for developing their IT skills, which in turn leads to better efficiency and time management.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake the academic audit or other external review of the academic provision? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Yes, academic audit takes place by the University. Inspection committees are regularly appointed by the University to audit various courses and general well-being of the institution.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanism aligned with the requirements of relevant external quality assurance agencies?

The College follows all the rules of the affiliating University KUK, UGC guidelines and DGHE instructions and maintains transparency in teaching-learning process, workload and conduction of examination and evaluation of results. It conducts curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular programs as per the schedule of Kurukshetra University Kurukshetra.



6.5.6 What Institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcomes?

The college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell dedicated to the mechanism of reviewing the teaching-learning process. The outcome proves valuable in bringing further improvement in the teaching learning process.

- The HODs of all departments are responsible for reviewing the teaching learning process. They take the help of other faculty members and collect feedback from the students to evaluate the performance of individual teachers.
- Teaching Plan on the prescribed University syllabi is submitted to the HODs of all the teaching department of the college in the beginning on the session.
- Syllabi Completion Certificate is submitted to the Head by the faculty of the department at the end of every session.
- Students are assessed internally through assignments, sessionals and attendance and through university examinations.
- The results of the students are reviewed and analyzed by the Principal and HODs.
- We are in touch with the parents on a regular basis. They are invited to all major functions of the college to give their valuable suggestions and feedback on various aspects related to the teaching-learning process.
- The Principal receives ACRs and APIs from the faculty at the end of each session to appraise their performance.

6.5.7 How does the institute communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stake holders?

The institution communicates its quality assurance policy, mechanisms and outcomes through College Prospectus, Annual Reports, Annual Magazine and Newsletter, Informal Parent-Teacher Meetings, Alumni Meet, and press releases of important college functions and activities. The principal presents Annual Report of the college on Prize Distribution Function and Convocation. The College circulates all the important information through notices displayed on the notice boards of various departments. The Management/Govt. and UGC are sent regular reports in the formats/feedback forms provided by AISHE etc. (Record available with the Nodal Officer)

CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes, Green audit of the campus is carried out by the staff periodically by supervising the maintenance of the existing trees and locating places for planting new trees. In the month of July, the Principal conducts meetings with members of Eco Club of the college, and faculty members of the Department of Botany and Zoology. These members survey the campus area of the college and suggest suitable plants to be planted in the rainy season of the year.

The NSS volunteers and NCC cadets conduct camps in the adopted village and adjoining areas to dig the pits and plant the saplings supplied by the Forest Department. Ornamental plants are purchased from various nurseries. The volunteers of Eco Club list out the demand of saplings (no. & nature of plants) by the students and these plants are distributed on the Tree Plantation Programme. The Traffic Police is invited to deliver lectures to enlighten the students to make their vehicles fuel efficient. The bio-degradable waste from the hostel kitchen mess is dumped into the pit on regular basis for vermicomposting and manure preparation. The latter is used for the college lawns as well as botanical garden. The Discipline Committee ensures that the class rooms and campus are kept clean and plastic free.

Environment consciousness is one of the key issues taken up by the college and tree plantation is our major concern to maintain the pristine purity and beauty of the college, providing a congenial atmosphere for the academic and non-academic pursuits.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus Eco-friendly?

The college tries to maintain an eco-friendly profile as far as possible. It also inculcates this value system among its students through Eco-Club, NSS, NCC, Science Forum activities, to maintain cleaner & greener surroundings.

*Energy Conservation

Minimal consumption of energy is the saving factor of energy conservation in the campus. The college building is so constructed that most of the rooms are well lit and properly aerated. The ceilings are quite high which keep the rooms cool & ventilated. The use of CFL bulbs instead of tungsten lamps, team and collaborative work in the same place and monitoring the electricity consumption closely by turning off the power during day time helps us conserve a lot of electricity. Other measures taken to prevent wastage of energy are:

1) Window ACs being replaced by split ACs.

2) Car pooling amongst the staff members is encouraged to reduce petrol consumption and air pollution.

* Use of Renewable Energy

We have no such facility as of now. But plans to install solar water heaters, solar cookers especially in the hostel are under consideration.



* Water Harvesting

The college is in the process of installing rain water harvesting system. However, internal walls & lanes laid at the time of construction of the college building are such that the rain water percolates in the soil.

* Check Dam Construction

No possibility for construction of check dam in this area.

* Efforts for Carbon Neutrality

Care is taken to restrict vehicle entry into the campus. Awareness programmes are conducted on special days by various departments to encourage plantation and adoption of existing trees by the students is encouraged.

* Plantation

The college is maintaining two big lawns besides a Botanical Garden and Green House. One lawn is in front of the Administrative Block and another is inside the hostel campus. There are a large number of ornamental plants and shady trees. Plantation programmes are taken up within and outside the campus area at the onset of rainy season. College authorities present potted plants as mementos to the visitors as a gesture to promote tree plantation.

* Hazardous Waste Management

The institution has no such problem.

* E-waste management

Our DAV management has several institutes running successfully in the city. These schools & colleges are closely knit and associated with each other. Department of Computer of the college is regularly donating those computer systems and accessories to these schools which are no longer compliant with the college curricula.

In fact, the college has an inter-disciplinary approach; science departments keep exchanging gadgets & equipments as per their requirements.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Keeping in view the challenges of the modern era, the institute expanded its academic and infrastructural facilities for the inclusive growth of the students during these five years. The institution expanded the infrastructure by establishing new laboratories in Biotechnology, Geography, Commerce Computer Science, Functional English, and Instrumentation. A separate Career Guidance and Counseling Cell is provided to cater the needs of job seeking students and to prepare for University Common Entrance Examination to pursue Higher Education (PG). The academic facilities are improved by introducing new combination with Biotechnology in B.Sc., Psychology in B.A. and B.Com. (Computer) as job-oriented self-financing courses. The college also introduced the UGC sponsored Job-oriented Add- on courses under dual degree programme: Functional English, Fashion Designing, Food Processing, Cosmetology, Animation / Multimedia/Web Designing. Library facilities are strengthened by purchasing a large number of text and reference books (a total of 51,666) and printed journals (20) and e-resources through INFLIBNET programme for B.A., B.Com. and B.Sc. courses at UG



level and M.Com and M.Sc. (Biotechnology), (Mathematics), (Geography) at PG level. Many of the lecturers working at present in this college are our alumni and are contributing to the development of the college and discharging their duties properly. All these members are actively participating in the academic programmes, extension activities and counselling with students. The potential of the Alumni association is utilized for the development of the Institution.

The following facilities are being provided by the college for the students during the last five years:

Interdisciplinary Approach:

Interdisciplinary programmes including Add-on courses like Functional English for improvement of communicative skills, Cosmetology & Fashion Designing for building entrepreneurship potential and Remote Sensing, Animation/Multimedia/Web Designing as career options have been established.

Innovative Techniques in Assessment:

Surprise tests, sessionals, class seminars, paper presentation, power point presentation, Poster and Collage presentation, assignments, quiz, debate and group discussions are made an integral part of the assessment.

The Technology Centre:

Our college boasts of more than 200 computers in its computer labs, imparting various courses at PG/UG levels. Central Lab for research is available to all and an audio visual centre is also available. Computerization of administrative block was completed in 2012.

Innovations in Infrastructural Planning:


An Audio-visual Centre, 2 seminar rooms, Conference Hall, a Biotechnology Lab, a lab for Bio-informatics, Instrumentation lab, computer labs, and some classrooms equipped with projectors, smart board, visualizers etc. are our educational assets. A kirloskar generator, CCTV, water coolers & RO have been added to the infrastructure. Our Library is equipped with computer systems having internet facilities, latest reference books, journals, competitive books, text books etc to cope up with the changed and latest curriculum.

- 1) Innovative ICT pedagogical tools
- 2) Student support services, student welfare activities and students leadership development programmes have been initiated.

Innovations for De-centralized Learning:

A higher focus learning is targeted through a spectrum of training activities– Computer training, Personality Development, Spoken English, Self-defence, Yoga and value oriented spirituality sessions, moral education, interesting sports activities such as Kayaking, Judo etc, cosmetology, tailoring & dress designing, cooking & food preservation, eco-consciousness aids the students in learning and fostering global competencies.

Special programs are chalked out to make our students 'Socially Responsible Citizens' under the flagship of NSS, NCC, Women Development Cell, Eco Club. Undertaking philanthropic activities such as adult education, blood donation, first aid training, AIDS awareness, scientific aptitude development among school students, gender sensitization through training of community workers, tree plantation, insurance related motivation etc have become integral



The Kalpana Chawla Alumni Association utilizes the knowledge, position and experience of our worthy alumni to give motivation and momentum to the growth of the institute.

Other innovations that have impacted the functioning of the college are: Introduction of PG courses in some faculties; issuance of grants under Star college scheme of DBT, New Delhi; mutual understanding with some national level institutes such as DWR for academic collaboration; Principal's Advisory Council's meeting to take operational decisions and to chalk out a blue print of issues to be discussed in the Academic Council of Department Heads, Examinations Committee, Discipline-in-charges etc.

All these efforts are made to bring in a sense of achievement, quality promotion and sensitization to burning issues at national level and inculcate a value system which will bear well with the girls forever in our quest for excellence.

2. Gender Sensitization and Social Awareness vis-à-vis Situation in Haryana

The Context:

It is oft stated "Education is not the preparation for life; education is life itself". Educating a girl child helps educate the whole family, therefore being a girls' institute, a perpetual need is felt to strengthen and uplift the status of girls through education. Education involves working on every aspect of a girl's personality, be it- career-building, physical fitness, economic independence, social stature strengthening, etc. This practice epitomizes sustained institutional efforts with long-term and long-range goals to augment their ability, talent and perception along with social, economic, cultural and political roles to overcome discrimination against women. Haryana particularly is plagued with women suppression to the extent that most girls are introvert.


Multiple issues like female infanticide, decreasing sex-ratio leading to "Atta-Batta" practice of forceful marriages, bride burning, dowry related issues, domestic violence have plagued this patriarchal society. Khaps pass dictates like 'girls be banned from wearing jeans', 'marriages within gotras', etc. The conservative atmosphere mars their efforts to look up individually.

Objectives:

- To empower women with knowledge, skills and confidence.
- To awaken a sense of responsibility amongst girls towards themselves and also for the community.
- To help our girls become the instruments of change in a gender-biased society in order to cultivate greater social and gender sensitivity.
- To rise above the issues of caste, class, gender, etc.

The Practice:

The practice to create gender sensitization and social awareness is a multidimensional approach. We, in the college, are working systematically on a whole range of activities in order to achieve our objectives. A glimpse of our continuing efforts to prevent and reverse the widely prevalent gender insensitivity are:



A high-quality outcome may be anticipated from this- developing our girls as confident, useful members of society, raising their self-esteem, making them economically independent in order to make them role-models for our future generations. Regular programmes intended to target the above mentioned issues spread grassroot awareness are held regularly. This corresponds with the vision and mission of the college.

Evidence of Success

Evidences of our success in this pursuit are many. Our girls are excelling as far as academic results are concerned; their participation in sports is obvious from medal-tally in international, national and state level sports competitions. The same holds good for our cultural displays during Youth Festivals, Science Exhibitions and a wide array of inter-college competitions. We even boast of being the only women's college in the state that roped in bureaucracy, administrative and police personnel alike and also Balwadi, Aanganwadi workers for National Human Rights Commission and UGC-sponsored in gender-sensitization workshop/seminars to bring and women empowerment. At local level way back in 1996, we convinced the Roadways authorities to start special buses for girls on various rural routes. We also run Red Ribbon Club to create AIDS and Reproductive Health Awareness among girls. The strength of girl students has risen from 1718 (2010-2011) to 2541 (2014-2015) with a vibrant strength of 293 (present inmates) residing in the hostel

Problems encountered and the Resources required

The status of women in Haryana is probably the biggest problem and also the reason for requirement of this practice.

- Women folk of the state is from rural and illiterate background and also from economically weaker strata of the society.
- Lack of sufficient platforms required for voicing and monitoring their muted grievances.
- Lack of funds and resources.
- Difficult to monitor the programs on certain occasions due to infective responses.

In addition to the two best practices, the college would like to highlight the following activities which have been successfully carried out in the best interst of the students:

The Fashion Show: A Significant Feature

In this era of 21st century, the horizon of education has widened enormously, encompassing a large number of vocational and professional courses. With the passage of time, these courses have gained immense popularity and at present, have attained an important place in the field of education. Every prestigious institution in India offers a wide range of these courses to keep pace with the changing global trends and requirements, and our college is no exception to it. The Home Science Department of the college offers one of the best creative



courses on the study of fashion and cosmetology of which the Annual Fashion Show is a significant feature. The main objectives of the Fashion Show are:

- To help the students realize their true potential in pursuing the courses.
- To facilitate the learning of the students.
- To make them confident in creating and developing new ideas and designs.
- To give them exposure to novel practices prevalent in the field of fashion.
- To familiarize them with the ancient as well as modern, classic as well as contemporary eras of fashion.
- Above all, to guide them in recognizing their distinct and unique self that gets reflected in their creative work.

"Style is the man," the proverbial saying of early twentieth century, meaning that one's chosen style reflects one's essential characteristics, epitomizes the fundamental concerns of the Annual Fashion Show held in the college. It is a well-known fact that fashion today is global, competitive and skill demanding which is why our college has a highly qualified and competent staff dedicated to imparting not only knowledge of fashion but also preparing the students for their future professional endeavors by focusing on the overall development of all the essential skills required for the course.

Department of Home Science organizes a Fashion Show on a grand scale every year since 2013. October onwards, the preparations for the show start with the detailed ground level research. Teachers and students go for a survey which includes designing of ideas, selection of themes, and selection of fabrics. The actual hard-work is done January onwards when the students give a concrete form to the ideas conceived. The strenuous effort begins under the supervision of teachers. The students start the preparation with the **stitching of garments, selection of the models and the planning for make-up**. The actual event takes place in mid of March every year. The highlight as well as the strength of the fashion show is that everything related to the show – from **fabric to designing to make-up to choreography- is all done solely by the students** and the teachers of the Home Science Department with the help of Cosmetology Department.

The Fashion Show provides a public forum to students to showcase their talent. Work created by them is juried by a team of faculty and industry professionals. Students present their work just as they would do in a Fashion Company. There are so many interesting and innovative rounds in the fashion show such as Kids Round, Barbie Round, Western Round, Traditional and Ethnic Round, Bridal Round, and Best out of Waste Round. The presentation of such a varied collection always wins the heart of the audience who are eventually spellbound by the fantastic creations of our students. In the end, top three selected students are rewarded.

The show has always been a tremendous success. Since students work assiduously and put in their best, the outcome has been very satisfying aesthetically. The various tasks assigned help in grooming and preparing them to be socially responsible and professionally confident. The show gives them a platform where they can give wings to their creativity. It also helps to boost their self-confidence and instills in them the quality to work as a team.

In addition to this, the Fashion Show has been very instrumental in spreading awareness about the fashion per se among the audience. Since, the show is open for the public, it not only enhances their knowledge and interest in



fashion but also encourages them to wish for a career in fashion. People, especially the parents, who attend the program come to realize that fashion is not just a mix and match of colors and fabrics but so much of hard work, labor, imagination, time and energy go into the making of a fashion artist who aspires to become a well-known successful fashion designer like **Ritu Beri**, **Manish Malhotra, Ritu Kumar and J.J. Walia.** The parents encourage their children to chase their dreams in the field of fashion. As a result, there has been a drastic increase in the number of students getting enrolled in B.Sc. Fashion Designing of the college. Due to an overwhelming response of the audience and the outstanding success of the program, the show has been able to attract the attention of many sponsors who wish to promote this wonderful endeavor economically which, in turn, removes the financial restraint on the mind of the young budding artists. Not only that, the sponsorship helps us organize the event on such a grand scale.

The field of fashion has winners that know how to create new ideas and concepts first, be proactive in business, and put a fresh spin on the existing concepts. We are very proud that our graduates are no exception to this. Having acquired the skill-based experience in college, the students pursue a variety of career options. Some opt for higher studies and qualify the entrance test of North India Institute of Fashion Technology, Punjab; some start working as freelancers and some start their own boutique and a few turn out to be good entrepreneurs.

Hostel Mess Facility

India is a land which propounded the philosophy of "Vasudhaiva Kutumbkam," meaning that "the world is one family". This very essence is kept alive and nurtured in our young girls who in search of knowledge and education decide to stay in the hostel of KVA DAV College for Women, Karnal. Our college is the only degree college between Karnal and Panipat that runs a girls hostel in the entire district. The hostel is a 'Home away from Home' for our girls. It houses approximately 300 students on sharing basis out of which 250 are under-graduates and 50 are post-graduate students. The city of Karnal is flanked by numerous villages and most of the parents these days are very keen to provide higher education to their daughters. In this scenario, availability of safe and comfortable living space for them becomes a must. The main objectives of the hostel facility are:


• To provide healthy and hygienic food by using authentic food products.

• In view of the minimal diet charges being drawn from the students, costcutting is one of the major objectives of this practice.

• To appoint mess staff after screening from the security (of girls) point of view.

• Students' participation in the selection of menu and maintenance of cleanliness.

Ever since the start of the hostel in the college premises, the hostel mess was being run by the contractor till 2011-12. Regular problems related to recruitment of reliable staff, behavior of mess boys, etc. had started cropping up especially during recent years. Timely dispersal of the food, costing, quality and hygiene were getting majorly compromised. Therefore, a unanimous decision was taken by the Advisory Committee to start up a mess



A Mess Committee comprised of senior staff members is formulated at the beginning of the session. A store-keeper has been appointed. Various items have been purchased for the hostel mess such as utensils, fridge, **chapatti maker machine**, **diesel bhathhi**, mixer-grinder, etc. Cereals, pulses and food products with longer shelf-life such as onions, potatoes, ginger, garlic etc. are purchased from local vendors after wholesale prices settlement. Day to day purchase of fruits and vegetables is done from vegetable market, and milk (average of 40-50 liters everyday) from Mother Dairy vendor. Simple vegetarian diet of 3 meals and evening tea is provided to the students. All care is taken to give them a **balanced and wholesome diet** for which involvement of the Department of Home Science is sought. A provision for **special diet during 'fasts' (weekly/navratras) at no extra cost** is a regular practice. **Special care is provided to the students** whose names are duly recommended by the college **Sports Committee are given free diet**.

The objectives listed have met with a tremendous success with our boarders. Students are extremely satisfied as far as the hostel mess is concerned. A tidy and systematic working of the mess has been appreciated by them. Regular monitored balanced diet has become a popular feature. A twenty four hours availability of proper and selected diet for sportspersons, sick students, and fasting students (weekly/navratras) has become our USP.

Besides such great efforts, there have been problems encountered in our endeavor and shortage of resources has been felt. At times, the price-hike of vegetables becomes a challenging factor; wastage of food by girls becomes another problem; trained manpower is difficult to arrange.

35. SWOC analysis of the department and Future Plans:

Strengths:

- a. <u>Regularity, punctuality and devotion</u> to work are the biggest strengths of the department. Regularity ensures the smooth functioning and devotion is proved by the brilliant results displayed by students in the University examinations. Their performance even after leaving College marks the impact that College has created on their overall personality development.
- b. <u>Faculty with consistent record of Research Paper Publication</u> and Conference presentations (National & International).
- c. <u>Prime Location of Karnal</u> presents us with National Institutes of par excellence such as CSSRI, DWR, NDRI, ICAR- Sugarcane Research Institute. Their expert faculty and laboratories provide us with necessary impetus.
- d. <u>A healthy, social and happy work environment</u> helps the department to energetically focus on the academic and research developments.
- e. <u>Student-teacher interactions outside classrooms:</u> This enables us to focus on important issues related to students and gives the faculty enough scope to improve on specific areas for the overall development.
- f. <u>Improved teaching methodologies</u> with the introduction of Over Head Projectors and Visualizer in the Lecture theatres.
- g. <u>Newer and greener methods</u> are being adopted to carry out experimental work.

Weakness:

- a. <u>Superficiality of the syllabus:</u> Some topics have been mentioned superficially in the course, which needs to be reviewed and modified. Indepth analysis of many topics (which are crucial from learning point of view) is missing.
- b. Getting academically weak students at the first year level.
- c. <u>Less job opportunities</u> in the market.
- d. <u>Delay in permanent appointment</u> and frequent changes in faculty destabilize the students' learning process.
- e. Shortage of skilled/non-skilled man-power.
- f. <u>Paucity of time in the semester system</u> to complete the syllabus. There is hardly any time for the students to go through extra material on their own in the library or elsewhere. Their extra-curricular activities have also suffered a lot on this account. One suffers at the cost of the other.
- g. <u>Paucity of funds</u>: Many more infrastructural developments suffer due to lack of funds.

Opportunities:

- a. The growing awareness on environmental issues and agriculture needs improved capacities for the staff to meet the demands of the students.
- b. Demand by environment protection agencies as Botany is intrinsically related to environmental science.
- c. To start new interdisciplinary programmes like Horticulture, Garden Art.



Challenges:

- a. Framing a syllabus which could help students meet the demands of employers such as industries and environmental agencies.
- b. To create subject interest in students for Botany and its throughout retention in the era of applied sciences is an extremely difficult task.
- c. To provide Quality education that prepares students for a global work environment with the existing faculty workload, finance and space

Future plans of the department:

- To introduce applied and short term courses such as horticulture, techniques in plant tissue culture, *etc*.
- To introduce PG course in the department.
- To include a research component in UG teaching.
- To publish quality research papers in peer reviewed journals.

Strengths:
